Good-Bye To The Volunteers

London's Splendid Farewell to Her Soldier Sons.

The Entire City Aflame With Military Ardor.

Stirring Scenes at the Barracks, at Victoria Park and at the Station.

Streets Ablaze With the National Colors and Densely Packed With People.

Mothers Marched Side by Side With Their Soldier Sons on the Way to the Station.

They're off!

And what a farewell it was! Perhaps the scene has been paralleled once in London's history. That was when the Seventh Battalion left for the Northwest. And the Northwest veterans, who were in line today, were vividly reminded of that scene. If years ago, when they marched through crowds such as London's streets had never beheld before.

In the march from Victoria Park to the Grand Trunk station, the departing troops had the appearance of a thin red line, piercing a black mass of people, who surged from curb to curb, cheering and waving hats and handkerchiefs. It was a roaring, cheering tumultuous crowd, with here and there touches of sadness in the faces of those who were bidding goodbye to near and dear ones. There were even some bonnets among the helmets; mothers and sisters, who walked in the ranks, so as to be with their boys and their brothers every precious moment of the time. Over all shone a brilliant sun, as if shedding a benediction on the departing heroes, and lighting up a picture which will long dwell in the memory of the beholders.

At the Barracks.

THE CITY'S GIFTS.
The presentations from the city to Major Stuart, the other officers, non-commissioned officers and men of B Company of South Africa contingent, were made at Wolseley Barracks this morning. An order by Col. Holmes, D. O. C., issued last evening, necessitated the change in the civic committee's original plans. And owing to the fact that the decision had not been made public, a small gathering of civilians, about 200, many of whom were relatives of the volunteers from outside places, witnessed the ceremony. Shortly before noon the men were lined up on the parade ground, facing west, and Major Stuart introduced Mayor Wilson. His worship announced that the committee on behalf of the citizens wished to present the members of the company with tokens of their esteem. The London company was a fine body of men, and each member he felt sure, would prove worthy of the pride that every citizen took in him. They were going to assist their Majesty in trouble, and with them would go the heartfelt wishes of the citizens of London for their safety and success.

Ald. Graham, chairman of the committee, then stepped forward. He also expressed the pleasure the citizens felt at having such worthy representatives. He was very thankful to outside municipalities for the men they had so kindly loaned to the city. "We now recognize you as Londoners," he said, "and feel sure that you will continue to be interested in us. There is but one other city that was the parallel of London, and that was a city of the same name." He bespoke a grand welcome on their return.

At this stage of the proceedings Ald. Parnell handed Chairman Graham a handsome sword and scabbard, on which was engraved: "Presented to Major Duncan Stuart by the citizens of London." Major Stuart stepped forward and saluted.

"On behalf of the citizens of London," said Ald. Graham, "I take great pleasure in presenting you with this sword. May you wear it to the glory of your country and your Queen in the case you are going to defend." (Applause.)

Major Stuart made a graceful reply. He was grateful for the honor done him. He would do the best he could to deserve it. "The men of B Company will do their part," he said. "Or that I am convinced." He then turned to me to do mine, which I will endeavor to do." The major was heartily applauded.

Ald. Carrothers then produced the campaign wrist watches for Capt. Ross, Capt. Mason and Lieut. Temple, the other officers of the company, and for Quartermaster-Sergt. Galloway, Sergt. George Sippi and Sergt. George Macbeth, London; Sergt. Bowden, Windsor, and Sergt. Gorman, Sarnia, the non-commissioned officers. Members of the committee strapped the watches on the wrists of the recipients.

don contingent—On behalf of the citizens of London, I wish you God-speed. Long may live our gracious Queen to see Canadian soldiers fighting shoulder to shoulder with the imperial troops, whenever the necessity may arise. Our sincere wish is that the Union Jack may wave from one side of Africa to the other, and then only will the outlanders have liberty and freedom. In conclusion we wish you all to return soon, covered with glory.

SCHOOL CHILDREN IN LINE

It was decided last night by the members of the school board that the scholars of the public schools would turn out to bid the Transvaal contingent Godspeed on their journey, and each school provided a large company. The scholars met at the Princess Rink at 12:30, and were formed into line by Mr. W. C. Cox, and moved off down Queen's avenue to Wellington street, and up Wellington street to Victoria Park, headed by a brass band. On arriving at the park the boys were stationed on the north side of the north driveway, and the girls on the south side of the driveway. Each scholar wore a badge bearing the city's coat of arms, and inscribed: "Honor to the brave Transvaal contingent, 1890." As the boys for South Africa entered the park the scholars sang lustily "Soldiers of the Queen," and followed

OTTAWA TIMBER LIMITS SOLD.
(Toronto, Oct. 25.—Yesterday afternoon the timber limits on the Spanish River, Algoma district, were auctioned off. W. F. Churchill, of Alpena, Mich., bought the southwest, northwest and northeast quarters of the township of Fossett, for \$28,500, \$132,500 and \$97,500, respectively. The C. W. Bell Company, of Penetanguishene, Ont., bought the township of Trett for \$160,000; and J. W. Monroe, of Pembroke, Ont., paid \$100,000 for the southeast quarter of Foster, and the northeast quarter of Nairn township went to him at \$5,200. The remaining quarters sold for \$80,000, \$51,000 and \$33,000, respectively, being purchased by the local representatives of different lumber firms. The total area sold is about 100,000 acres, said to be virgin forest, and heavily timbered.

At Victoria Park.

At 1 o'clock B Company, in command of Capt. Stuart, marched out of the barrack yard. They were accompanied by No. 1 Company, R. C. R. I., in command of Col. Holmes. An immense crowd of citizens had gathered at the barracks to witness the departure and accompanied the soldiers to Victoria Park. The route taken was through the archway to Elizabeth street, to Piccadilly street, to Waterloo street, to Pall Mall street, to Wellington street, entering the park through the Wellington street gate.

In the meantime all the local military corps, and the civic bodies had assembled at the drill shed at 12:45, and were drawn up in a hollow square about the band stand, leaving an opening on the west side, through which the Transvaal Company marched and took up a position on the west side of the band stand, and facing it. The boys of B Company were greeted on their arrival with deafening cheers.
