GUESE.

London, Monday, Sept. 24. - Telegrams from Lorenzo Marquez assert ceived from London, and are being that 1,500 Boers, including Command-ant Pienner and thirteen leading offiant Pienner and thirteen leading officers, surrendered with their arms and ammunition to the Portuguese today. All of them were placed in jail.

British patrols have reached the Portuguese frontier. Boers continue to cross above and below the portion held by the British. The riding horses of the Boers are in a terrible condition. Messrs. Steyn and Reitz (says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Lorenzo Marquez) will remain with the fighting burghers, and it is estimated that a force of Boers aggregating seven to

CAPE ASSEMBLY Cape Town, Sept. 24. - Mr. J. W. Sauer, the former commissioner of public works, introduced an independence resolution in the Cape Parlia-ment today, declaring that the spirit of independence in the Transvala and Orange River Colonies might be kept down with bayonets for a time, but it would rise again. The peace of South Africa, he further asserted, called for the restoration of the inde-

pendence of the two republics. The premier, Sir J. Gordon Sprigg, replied vigorously, advising Mr. Sauer, to address himself to Messrs. Kruger and Steyn. In the course of the debate the premier, referring to the attacks on capitalists, said that Mr. Kruger was the greatest capitalist in the country, and that he was not only a capi-

talist, but a thief. Mr. J. X. Merriman, who was colonial treasurer in the Schreiner ministry, declared that annexation would result in England's losing South Af-

rica, and in even worse things, for South Africa would lose England. Mr. Schreiner, the former premier, moved in amendment to Mr. Sauer's resolution to the effect that the two republics should be peaced under the protection of the Queen, with a guarantee preserving their national exist-

ence. The house rejected the Schreiner amendment and by a vote of 41 against 39, decided to go into committee of supply without discussing Mr. Sauer's motion or the amendment.

STORM AT NOME

Creates Havoc for Miles Along the Beach.

Serious Loss of Life Probable-At Least 500 People Homeless.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 25 .- The steamer Roanoke brings news of a most disastrous storm at Nome. It raged two days up to the evening of Sept. 13, and was the severest ever experienced in Western Alaska. A number of barges and lighters were driven ashore and totally wrecked. All along the beach for miles both east and west of Nome the wind and water created havoc with tents and mining machinery. A number of lives are believed

to have been lost. It is known that Andrew A. Ryan, of Los Angeles, was drowned. Several captains and seamen on small tugs are missing, and it is thought they are

Fully 500 people are homeless and the loss to property and supplies is over half a million dollars. There is not an alley leading to the beach that is not filled with debris. Numerous small buildings were swept completely away. The damage to buildings, tents. household effects, merchandize and other goods and chattels is seen everywhere along the waterfront. A serious loss is the disappearance

of over 2.000 tons of coal.
