Erasmus' Commando

Attacked a British Garrison and Was Repulsed.

Lord Roberts Issues Another Proclamation to the Burghers— Boers Skipping Over the Border Into Portuguese Terri- tory—100 Surrendered—Invalided Canadians.

London, Sept. 24.—Lord Roberts re-
ports from Pretoria, under date of
yesterday, as follows:
"Erasmus' commando, with two guns
and a pom-pom, attacked Elands River
station yesterday. The garrison, num-
bering 200, repulsed the Boers, who lost
11 men. During the fight Paget cap-
tured 2,500 cattle. Plummer's Bush-
men also engaged the commando, cap-
turing 750 cattle and 1,000 sheep."

A PROCLAMATION.
A proclamation has been issued an-
nouncing that the burghers who volun-
tarily surrender will not be sent out
of the country, but will be detained in
camps at Bloemfontein or Pretoria. In
case of their having stock, selected re-
presentatives will be allowed to take
charge of the cattle. This proclama-
tion gives great satisfaction to those
who are anxious to see the war con-
clude, as it is believed that it will
give the coup de grace to the Boer
resistance. It has been repeatedly
stated that many of the burghers
would lay down their arms if they
were assured that they would not be
sent to St. Helena or Ceylon by the
British.

News received here from the east is
to the effect that the Boer forces in
that part of the country are in a
complete state of disorganization. A
few diminished and disunited com-
mandos are returning to the west-
ward with scanty supplies of ammuni-
tion.

NEAR ITS END.
Johannesburg, Sept. 24.—It is re-
ported that the war will be officially
declared at an end in a day or two.

TWO THOUSAND REFUGEES.
Cape Town, Sept. 23.—Col. Girouard
is expected to arrive here today to
arrange railway transportation for
the return of the refugees from the
Orange Free State and the Transvaal
to their homes. The first trains will
carry 10,000 tons of foodstuffs. Then
the commercial and mining store-
keepers will be sent through. After-
wards the remaining refugees to the
number of about 20,000 will receive
transportation. The latter will prob-
ably begin to return by the end of
October.

CAPE ASSEMBLY.
Cape Town, Sept. 24.—Mr. J. W.
Sauer, the former commissioner of
public works, introduced an indepen-
dence resolution in the Cape Parlia-
ment today, declaring that the spirit
of independence in the Transvaal and
Orange River Colonies must be kept
down with bayonets for a time, but
it would rise again. The peace of
South Africa, he further asserted,
called for the restoration of the inde-
pendence of the two republics.

The premier, Sir J. Gordon Sprigg,
replied vigorously, advising Mr. Sauer,
to address himself to Messrs. Kruger
and Steyn. In the course of the debate
the premier, referring to the attacks
of capitalists, said that Mr. Kruger
was the greatest capitalist in the coun-
try, and that he was not only a capi-
talist, but a thief.

Mr. J. K. Merriman, who was colon-
el treasurer in the Schreiner minis-
try, declared that annexation would
result in England's losing South Af-
rica, and in even worse things for
South Africa would lose England.

Mr. Schreiner, the former premier,
moved in amendment to Mr. Sauer's
resolution to the effect that the two
republics should be placed under the
protection of the Queen, with a guar-
antee preserving their national exist-
ence.

The house rejected the Schreiner
amendment and by a vote of 41 against
39, decided to go into committee of
supply without discussing Mr. Sauer's
motion or the amendment.
