A Rousing Meeting

City Hall Crowded With Immense Gathering of Electors.

Workingmen Turn Out in Force to Honor Canada's First Minister of Labor.

Stirring Addresses by Hon. Senator David Mills, Hon. Wm. Mulock, the Liberal Candidate, Mr. C. S. Hyman, and George C. Gibbons, Q.C.—An Enthusiastic Audience.

The Liberal campaign in London was opened at the city hall last night. To say merely that the large hall was crowded would give only an inadequate idea of the meeting's size; and to say that it was boundlessly enthusiastic would not fully describe the animation with which the speeches of the evening were received. With pardonable regard for the much-abused superlative, it must be said that last night's meeting was one of the largest, one of the most effective that has ever been held in the interests of the Liberal party in London. Surely an assemblage of such numbers, and controlled by such a united desire to pay tribute to the representatives of the progressive govern- ment that now guides the ship of state in Canada, is a testimony of in- disputable weight to the popularity of that administration in this city. It was only natural, however, that such a success should be attained. On the programme were the names of two members of the Laurier government— one of them Hon. David Mills, minister of justice, and a citizen of our own city, and the other Hon. William Mulock, postmaster-general, and the first Canadian minister of labor. It was probably because he occupied this latter position, because of his known interest in the condition of the work- ingmen of the Dominion, and his ef- forts on their behalf, that there were attracted to the hall so many of the workmen of London. This, also, was the honorable gentleman's first appearance before the electorate of this city, and coming, as he did, in the interests of the strong Liberal candi- date, Mr. Charles S. Hyman, his ad- dress was listened to with more than usual interest. Another factor that helped materially in the gratifying success of the meeting was that Mr. Hyman himself made his first address to the electors, whose representative at Ottawa he will undoubtedly be dur- ing the next four years. The north gallery was reserved for ladies, and was well filled with the fair sex and their escorts. The singing of the Laurier Male Quartet, Messrs. Stewart Huntington, Newton Larie, Edward Gardner and Ruthven Mc- Donald, was a pleasant feature of the evening. They were repeatedly en- cored. Two huge Union Jacks were suspend- ed near the speakers' platform, and the walls of the hall were hung with many banners, inscribed with mottoes as follows: "The device that I give unto you is Union, Peace, Friendship and Frater- nity." "Don't stop the growing time." "The choice is between Foster's de- fects and Fielding's surpluses." "Mulock and penny postage—A Hand Across the Sea." "The British preference a link of empire." "Canada above all and always."—Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The gentlemen who were to speak ascended to the platform about 8 o'clock, and were tendered an ovation that was truly prodigious in its fervor and continuance. With the chairman, Mr. Charles S. Hyman, Mayor Rumball, Mr. Thomas Coffey, Mr. F. Leonard, Ald. Brenner, Ald. Stevenson, Mr. A. O. Jeffery, Mr. W. R. Hobbs, Dr. C. I. Campbell and Mr. Hume Cronyn. The meeting was called to order by the president of the London Liberal Association, George C. Gibbons, Q.C., who was warmly received on rising. He expressed his pleasure at the mag- nificent gathering of electors in the hall, and was confident that it fore- boded victory for Mr. Hyman.

The Candidate.

Mr. Hyman was tendered an ovation on rising to address the gathering, and the cheering was so hearty and prolonged that it was several minutes before he could make himself heard. He thanked those assembled for their kindly and hearty greeting. It can well be remembered, said the speaker, that before the Liberal government came into power the business of the Dominion was in a state of general stagnation all over the country. There was a falling off in the exports and imports, in the business of the Do- minion, and a large exodus of young people to the United States. Domestic politics were in anything but a sat- isfactory state, and the great Manitoba school question was far from being settled. Then the government of that day was anything but a happy family, and the name of Canada was known in England simply as a byword. When the Laurier government came into power all this was changed. The trade of the Dominion increased by leaps and bounds—indeed, to an enor- mous extent. The exodus of young people to the United States, the speaker was happy to say, had almost entirely stopped, as they now could find plenty of employment in the Dominion. (Heard.) In domestic politics the Liberal government was the utmost unity and harmony prevailed, and the great question deal- ing with the Manitoba schools had been happily and satisfactorily settled. The Liberal government was a government of honorable and progressive men, who had the interests of the Dominion at heart (applause)—and no member had ever been directly charged with a dis- honest act, in spite of the fact that the Conservatives had cried corruption on every hand. (Cheers.) The Conservatives charged that the Liberals had stolen the policy, and then their tariff clothes. The speaker at this point read a clipping taken from a speech made by Sir Charles Tupper, in which he stated that if the tariff proposed by the Liberals went into operation, the industries of Canada would be ruined, and stating that no greater wrong could be inflicted on the Dominion. Was Sir Charles a good prophet? Had his predictions of ruin- ed industries, closed mills and a gen- eral deplorable state of things that he pictured, come true? No; but the tariff, which Sir Charles de- nounced had been in force four years, and the great strides made in the trade of the country were simply won- derful, and evidences of prosperity were to be seen on every hand. (Hearty applause.) The speaker then went on to show the marvelous growth of trade under the Laurier administration. The ex- ports in 1878 amounted to \$79,223,000; in 1896, \$121,013,000; in 1900, \$191,897,000; a total increase of \$116,674,000, under Con- servative rule, while the increase of four years under Liberal rule was \$70,844,000. Under Conservative rule the export trade increased at the rate of 500,000 a year, while under Liberal rule it increased \$1,800,000 a month. (Heard.) Dealing with the import figures, the speaker showed that in 1878 the imports were \$92,081,000; in 1896, \$118,011,000; in 1900, \$158,725,000; an increase in the years of Liberal rule of \$77,717,000, while the increase under eight years of Conservative rule was only \$24,830,000—under Liberal rule an in- crease of \$150,000 per month, and under Conservative rule only \$1,000,000 a year. Mr. Hyman next dealt with the British preference, having that there was a clear line drawn on this question between the Liberal and Conservative parties. Sir Charles and his followers had come out and attacked the measure, on the ground that nothing short of free trade could be satisfactory to Canada, thus showing their loyalty to be not a matter of instinct but of pro- fession. The preferential tariff had given relief to the people of the Do- minion, without injuring manufactur- ing interests. Better markets had been provided, and taxation had been decreased. The preferential tariff had also enlisted the sympathy of the British people in Canada. The imports from Great Britain in 1878 were \$57,431,000; in 1896, \$32,570,000; in 1900, \$41,000,000; a decrease under eight years of Conservative rule, \$4,452,000; and an increase of \$11,665,000 under four years of Liberal rule. The exports to Great Britain were: In 1878, \$35,801,000; in 1896, \$62,718,000; in 1900, \$97,452,000; an increase in the eighteen years of Conservative rule of only \$35,570,000; while under four years of Liberal rule they increased \$43,744,000. Mr. Hyman then gave figures to show the greatly increased foreign trade since the Liberals took the reins of power. In 1873, \$172,404,000; in 1896, \$239,025,000; in 1900, \$331,625,000. In- crease in eighteen years of Conserva- tive rule, \$66,221,000; under four years of Liberal rule, \$142,800,000—of, under Conservative rule, only \$3,000,000 a year, and under Liberal rule, \$3,000,000 a month. In dealing with the finance question, the speaker gave the following com- parative statement of surplus and deficit for the last three years of Con- servative administration and the three years of Liberal administration:
