#### Life of Rev. Dr. Cochrane.

"The Life of William Cochrane," by Rev. R. N. Grant ("Knoxonian") published by William Briggs, Toronto, is a decidedly interesting biography. The relations between Rev. Dr. Cochrane and his biographer were evidently close and kindly, and the materials at the latter's disposal were full. Dr. Grant has made good use of them, and as we read the story of the young Scotch lad's early labors, we are led to see that the old proverb was verified in his case, and that the "boy was father to the man." From the very first Dr. Cochrane was a glutton for work, and it cannot be doubted that had his energies been devoted to other lines of effort, in commerce or politics, he would still have been a distinguished man. Several characterastics stand out prominently in this record of his life. He was an indefatigable toiler; exceptionally versatile; truly devout; and exceedingly warm-hearted. The large part that he payed in the development of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, especially in regard to its home mission work, is brought before us in this volume as fully as such a busy and useful life may be recorded in printed page. The many readers who are familiar with Dr. Grant's literary style will not be surprised to find here the caustic sentences with which he punctures pretense of any sort; and In writing the life of Dr. Cochrane this skill is used only when some contrast is made with the sterling qualities and thorough manliness of his friend. To those who knew Dr. Cochrane only in the full tide of his eminently useful and honorable life it will be a surprise to note that as a on a platform as broad as the horizon. young man particularly he was evidently much troubled with the demon of despondency, and this fact redounds to his honor; for only to his diary or some very dear friend was any such revelation ever made. Dr. Cochrane was greatly blessed in natural endowments, in providential surroundings, in swift removal when at the very height of his usefulness at Brantford: and now that this worthy life has been reviewed and published, it may be said that he has been blessed, too, in his biographer. Many who knew and loved "the doctor" in life will be glad to have this record of his life and labors in their homes.
