LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

The waterworks department took in \$5,000 in water rates on Monday.

—W. Symington, of Sarnia, G. T. R. ticket agent at that place, was in the city yesterday.

—C. Dickson, district passenger agent Grand Trunk Railway, was in the city yesterday.

—If satisfactory arrangements can be made the Orient Minstrels, of London, will give a performance at the opera house, St. Thomas, at an early date.

—From the present appearance of the list of guests expected to attend the Hunt ball in the Grand Opera House on Friday, this is going to be the most brilliant success the Hunt Club have ever enjoyed.

—Mr. Ed. McBride, who for the past eight years has been a resident of Calgary, N. W. T., is visiting friends in the city. Mr. McBride is an ex-Londoner, and is now conducting a large business in the Prairie Province.

—Extensive preparations are being made for the reception and comfort of guests for the Hunt ball in the Opera House on Friday evening next. The attendance promises to be very large. Many guests will be present from western cities.

—At Osgoode Hall, in Dominion Savings and Investment Society vs. Sutherland, Purdon (London), for the plaintiffs, moved on consent for an order of reference to the master at London under sec. 102 of the Judicature Act. Granted.

—Mrs. Moss, of New York city, who was expected by the London Spiritualists to arrive in the city some time ago and conduct a series of seances, is seriously ill in Cleveland, Ohio. As soon as she fully recovers from her present illness, Mrs. Moss will come to the city and fulfill her engagements.

—Mr. Murray Anderson, of London, whose 80th birthday was noted in these columns last week, bought and used the first steam engine run in London. It was six horse power, and was used by him in the manufacture of tinware. It was built by Macpherson, Glasgow & Co., of Fingal, about the year 1850. —[St. Thomas Journal.]

—A hearty vote of thanks was given at the last meeting of the Protestant Home Board to W. K. D., who so kindly sent \$14 in aid of the home; also the thanks of the board are due to the following friends who sent donations after our Christmas list had been published: John Wright, \$2; Mrs. Thornley, \$2; Mrs. Warner, \$1; Mrs. Crisp, \$5; Mrs. Jas. —The Methodist Young People's Association of Ontario will hold their third annual convention in London on March 20, 21 and 22. Dr. Clark, president of the United Church of Canada, Secretary Secretary Schell, of the Epworth Society, Methodist Episcopal Church, and Dr. Farrar, of Albany, N. Y., will be among the speakers. A large attendance of delegates is expected.

—A cooking school for the benefit of young women was opened in Somerset Hall last night. It is conducted under the auspices of the W. C. T. U., and, judging from the large attendance at the opening lesson, the school will prove a grand success. All the utensils necessary to conduct a school have been supplied, and under the direction of Miss McLean, formerly of New York, those who attend are sure to be benefited. A large number of those in attendance last night signified their intention of following up the course.

—The Humane Society in Toronto has issued a circular to all interested in the noble work. It earnestly asks the co-operation of all existing societies in carrying out the provisions of the existing law against cruelty. Several important amendments to the present bill are coming before the Legislature, and it is necessary to give due weight to the humane sentiment of the country. Steps are to be taken to organize a Dominion society at once. W. R. Brock, president of the Toronto society, will be glad to communicate with any.

Left in London.

There were some vexed Woodstockers at the G. T. R. station shortly before midnight last night. A large number had come from that place to witness the performance of Wilson Barrett. It was late when the show ended and a rush was made for the station. The Erie Limited was waiting to go east at 11:40, and just as the advance guard of the Woodstock delegation reached the western end of the platform the bell began to ring. A few feet of foot among the men caught the last coach, but the greater part missed the train entirely. There were many ladies in the party and some immediately went to the hotels and put up until morning train time. To accommodate the belated passengers a coach was attached to the freight that went through here at 1 o'clock.

Church Dedication.

The dedication of the new Methodist Church, Kingsville, took place on Sunday morning, the service being conducted by Rev. Dr. Aylesworth, president of the London Conference. The large auditorium was filled at each of the three services during the day, the Rev. Wm. Godwin preaching in the afternoon and Dr. Aylesworth again in the evening. The sermons by both gentlemen were excellent, while the musical part of the exercises was of a very high order. The Methodists of Kingsville are rejoicing over the successful issue of the new enterprise, the church being dedicated free of encumbrance. The cost of the church, including the pipe organ was \$15,000, \$9,000 of which had been previously secured in subscription by the pastor, Rev. J. Wilson, M.A. At the opening services a week ago an appeal was made, which resulted in the raising of \$7,000, being \$1,000 over the amount required to pay the indebtedness. The members of the congregation are profuse in their praise of the pastor, to whom more than to anyone else is due the success of the undertaking. His zeal, patience and excellent business qualities are spoken of by all, the only regret being that he will have so short a time to enjoy the result of his labors, as his pastoral term closes in June of this year. Rev. W. W. Barker of Detroit, stated at the opening that the church is the handsomest and most complete Methodist church of its size between Quebec and Windsor.

Railroad Men in London.

The railway committee of the Board of Trade met at 2:30 yesterday afternoon to confer with representatives of the different railroads running into London with a view to facilitating interchange of freight between the G. T. R., the C. P. R. and the M. C. R. by means of connecting switches. The members of the board present were: M. Masnret, A. M. Smart, C. S. Hyman, M. P., John Green, C. W. Leonard, S. Sterling, T. S. Hobbs, W. A. Gunn, Jas. Cowan, L. H. Ingram, Geo. D. Cameron, J. D. Stunby, T. H. Carling, John McCall, D. W. Blackwell. The railroads were represented by Messrs. Tait, J. W. Leonard (division superintendent), Toronto; G. M. Bosworth, J. N. Sutherland, Lanigan, Williams and Houston representing the C. P. R.; John Burton (general freight agent) and John Earle (district freight agent) representing the G. T. R.; John Crampton, Buffalo, N. Y. (general freight agent), and A. Stuart (local freight agent) representing the M. C. R., and Mr. W. A. Woolatt, manager of the L. E. and D. R. R. The matter was fully discussed, but nothing definitely settled upon. The merchants were favorable to the idea, as also were the representatives of the different roads with the exception of the Grand Trunk. It was decided to hold another meeting very soon (probably at Montreal) to try to come to a satisfactory settlement. If the matter cannot be arranged between the roads at the next meeting it will then go to arbitration.

Who Will Be Warden?

There promises to be quite a lively time over the election of Middlesex county's warden when the county council of 1894 convenes for the first time next Tuesday, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. This contest has generally been based on party lines. If an exception is not made in this instance a tie in the votes may ensue—there are 24 Liberals and 24 Conservatives in the personnel.
