PERTH.
Wm. Cook, the well-known Stratford
baggage man, was thrown out of his dray
and suffered a broken shoulder.

\$10,000, divided into 1,000 shares of \$10
each, has been signed by the Lieutenant-
Governor.

The boy thief who stole a horse and

has been captured in St. Marys. He said
he was 11 years of age, was born in Strat-
ford, and lived in Detroit. He was re-
manded for eight days.

WELLINGTON.
No proceedings have as yet been taken
in the case of Maggie Lockner, of Pus-
linch, against whom the coroner's jury re-
turned a verdict of guilty of infanticide.
The crown has decided to apprehend Alex-
ander, brother of the unfortunate girl, but
the young man is not to be found. It is
supposed he has left the country. Be-
fore going he is alleged to have admitted to
his father that Maggie spoke the truth
when she stated he was the father of the
child.

A very affecting memorial service for the
late Miss Clarke, who died in the African
mission field, was held in the Congrega-
tional Church, Guelph, on Sunday night.
Leonard, brother of the well-known retired
merchant of Guelph, received a wire from
Provo City, Utah Territory, informing him
of the death of his son Albert. The young
man was accidentally shot in the abdomen.
His brother, Dr. Cormack, has gone to
Utah.

It is understood that by his will the late
George Elliott, of Guelph, has left \$10,000
as a nucleus for a new wing to the general
hospital, and a further sum of about \$15,000
for the erection of a home for the poor.
He has left \$5,000 for the widows' and
orphans' fund of the Diocese of Niagara and
\$1,000 for the aid of disabled seamen.
His own church, St. George's, receives
\$2,000 for special objects. A large number
of bequests are made to relatives and
friends.

SEVERAL UNSAVORY SUBJECTS

Discussed by the Board of
Health.

The Matter of Handling Hides Evokes
a Heated Debate—A Milk Dealer's
Plaint—The Carling's Creek
Nuisance.

A petition was presented at last even-
ing's meeting of the Board of Health from
120 residents complaining of the use to
which a building on the southeast corner of
Talbot and York streets is being put by
T. W. Wrighton. They state that the efflu-
via emanating from the hide here
is exceedingly nauseating to dwellers
in the vicinity as well as unpleasant to
pedestrians. The petition also stated that
the loading and unloading of these hides
was not only unsightly but conducive
to sickness. The Board of Health
represented the petition, had attempted to
obviate the nuisance by certain regulations.
These, however, had been found wholly
inadequate. The business should not be
permitted under any circumstances in the
place mentioned.

Dr. Fraser, who lives opposite the build-
ing, stated that on a very hot Sunday re-
cently the stench was oppressively ob-
noxious.

Mr. J. B. McKillop said that people as
far east as the Tecumseh House were com-
plaining of the same nuisance.
Dr. Hutchinson, in reply to a question,
said the proprietors of the establishment
had carried out the regulations instituted
by the board last year.

Mr. Wrighton said that he had
done everything in his power to place the
premises in a thoroughly sanitary con-
dition. He did not deny that there was
an effluvia from the business; but was there
an odor of some kind peculiar to almost
every business? He held that it would be
an injustice to interfere with the business
of a man who was trying to carry it on in
a straightforward and respectable manner.

If the board interfered in this matter
where would such regulatory proceedings
end?

On motion the petition was referred to a
sub-committee composed of Ald. Heams,
Dr. Hutchinson and Ald. Stevens. The
secretary was also asked to communicate
with the Toronto and Hamilton Boards of
Health in reference to establishments of a
similar nature in those cities.

A resident of Fullarton street complained
of the disagreeable condition of two closets
in his neighborhood. Inspector Bell
said there was no one to pay for the work
of cleaning. He said \$5 would cover the
expense.

Ald. Scarrow moved that Inspector Bell
be asked to supervise the renovation and
send the bill to the board.

Ald. Parnell thought residents should
look after this matter themselves.

Ald. Scarrow knew that no money could
be procured from that quarter.

"Well, you don't run this board," said
Ald. Parnell, "and I think that the prop-
erty in question should be assessed for ex-
pense incurred. Is the property worth
nothing?"

"I don't think so," replied Ald. Scarrow.
"It's mortgaged for all it is worth."

"Well," continued Ald. Parnell, "I am
here for a purpose. Mr. Chairman, I am
here to see that in every
respect the interests of the citizens should
be conserved. I don't believe in running
up the taxes in this fashion. I wouldn't
acquiesce in such a proceeding even if the
result would only cost me the millionth
part of a mill."

Ald. Scarrow—Ah, you're talking wind.
"Mr. Chairman," continued Ald. Parnell,
"do you permit such talk at this board?"

"Here the alderman waited for a
reply from the presiding officer."

"I didn't hear what he said," remarked
that gentleman.

"I'm not going to be insulted by Ald.
Scarrow," proceeded Mr. Parnell.

"What did he say?" queried the chair-
man.

"Let him speak for himself," ejaculated
Ald. Parnell. "Let him repeat the state-
ment if he dares."

"I said you were talking wind—nothing
but wind," affirmed Ald. Scarrow.
Ald. Parnell dropped the subject.

question was referred to Inspector Bell.

recommend to the council the adop-
tion of the North trap for drainage
purposes. The trap was a home production;
it was cheaper than any other apparatus of
a similar nature, and it was much more
efficient. Ald. Skinner seconded the
resolution. The recommendation was
approved.

The residents of Wortley road, between
Bruce and Alma streets, want the drain on
that thoroughfare, which formerly led to
an outlet on Geary's Flats, continued to

The board recommended the ex-
pense of \$500 towards defraying the ex-
pense. The board recommended the
council to accept the proposition.
