150 CHINESE DROWNED

Canton River Steamer Sunk by Collision.

Prize of \$20,000 Offered for Airship Voyage From London to Birmingham.

Santa Domingo Drops the Duties on Sugar—Features of the King's Visit to Plymouth—Hush to South Africa—Coercion for Ireland.

150 DROWNED.

Hong Kong, March 8.—It is reported from Canton that a river steamer plying on the Canton River ran down a native passenger boat, and that 150 persons were drowned.

THE KING AT PLYMOUTH.

London, March 10.—King Edward and Queen Alexandra participated in a number of inspections and ceremonies at Plymouth Saturday, including the distribution of China medals.

The recipients were Admiral Sir Edward Hobart Seymour, who commanded the first Peking relief expedition. The principal ceremony was the launching of the battleship Queen and the laying of the keel plate of the King Edward VII.

Nothing happening in South Africa or at Westminster rivals the royal progress in Devonshire and the coming historic ceremony in the Abbey as a subject of public interest. What is proved wherever the King goes in England is the fact that the ornament or ceremonial side of monarchy has acquired a new lustre and glamor, and appeals to the imagination as well as to the loyalty of subjects.

The King and Queen will celebrate on Monday the anniversary of their wedding by a dinner party at Marlborough House. This is a quiet day in London.

BRITISH POLITICS.

The government grows more torrid as opposition languishes and weakens. The education bill, naturally, will be dropped as a most inconvenient measure, which can hardly fail to create a bad feeling among the educationists. The Irish land bill may also be deferred, as a contentious proposal which will only tend to unsettle what has been half settled.

Before the end of the week the government's position will be made clear, and the alternative party system of government. The fact that the Liberal party has gone from bad to worse, and the ministerial crisis, is a sign of the times.

COERCION FOR IRELAND.

Despite the premature announcement of the substitution of the coercion programme, there is reason to believe that the ministers have been frightened by the steady progress of the Irish land bill, and that a belated attempt may be made to grapple with it. The postponement of the education bill, and the few words of primary and secondary education will be discredited when the local authorities throughout the country are demanding evolution from chaos to order in the existing arrangements, but the reversion to the coercion of Ireland will be a failure.

It seems incredible that Mr. O'Brien's power should be challenged by a few words of the coronation festivities, but the Unionist journals are already denouncing him as a frenzied fanatic, and his policy is being treated as a desperate measure.

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
