LOCAL MARKET.

London, Monday, Oct. 7.
There was a very small supply of hay on
the market today. Certainly the price
and the brisk demand should be a tempta-
tion to farmers who have hay to sell, but
they know that the crop is short, and can
afford to be independent.

Seven loads of hay were offered, and
sold at \$15.50 to \$17 per ton.
No oats or straw offered.
Three loads of wheat sold at \$1 per bu.
Mr. McIntyre had about 150 live hogs
weighed on the scales, for which he paid
\$6 per cwt for select; fat sows sold at
\$4.50 per cwt.

Hay, oats, butter and eggs should sell
well tomorrow.

DAIRY MARKET.

ST. HYACINTHE, Que., Oct. 5.—Three thou-
sand five hundred and thirty-five packages
of butter sold at 25¢; 700 white cheese at
12½¢ and 200 colored at 12½¢.

Pictou, Ont., Oct. 5.—At the cheese board
today 19 factories boarded 630 cool cured,
522 ordinary cured; total, 1,152, all colored;
620 cool cured sold at 12½¢ and 532 ordi-

BELLEVILLE, Ont., Oct. 5.—At the regular
cheese board meeting today 3,025 white and
320 colored were offered; 230 sold at 12½¢,

CANADIAN CHEESE UP.
London, Oct. 5.—The price of Canadian
cheese will be raised 6½d to 7½d per lb.
The cause of the raise is the growing popu-
larity. Choicest white, 6½¢; colored, 6½¢;
there is very little except poor goods to
be had below 6½¢.

Butter—Supplies are smaller than usual
at the present time, especially Canadian;
prints of cheese are 10¢ to 11¢.

COWANSVILLE, Que., Oct. 5.—The weekly
meeting of the Eastern Townships Dairy-
men's Exchange was held here today; 25
creameries offered 1,779 boxes butter, and
17 factories offered 1,152 boxes cheese.

Butter, 1,694 boxes at 26¢ and 105
boxes at 25¢; 70 boxes unsold. Cheese,
291 boxes at 12½¢ and 125 boxes at 12½¢,
and 55 boxes at 12½¢; all sold.

VANKLEEK HILL, Ont., Oct. 5.—There were
315 boxes of cheese board and sold on
the market today; cheese was offered at
12½¢, and at this figure all were sold on
the board. Five buyers were present:
Rolan, Weagar, Fraser, Baker and Mc-
Donald.

CORNWALL, Ont., Oct. 5.—At the Cornwall
cheese and butter board today, 1,027 boxes
and cheese were boarded, of which
white were sold at 12½¢, except 25
boxes; 221 boxes colored sold at 12½¢.

Cheese—The market has been quiet, the
inquiry being limited to absolute require-
ments. There is no alteration in values
to report, but with quotations a shade
lower from Canada, importers are more
apathetic as to the future.

Cable advices also from New Zealand indi-
cate the possibility of a largely-increased
supply there. We quote today: Finest West-
ern Canadian, white and colored, 58½d to
62½d per cwt; white, 58½d; colored, 58½d;
choicest white, 58½d; 64 to 58½d; a few Quebecs,
chiefly white, sold at about 57½d to 58½d.

Butter—Continental produce has been in
moderate request, and the full cable ad-
vice has not been obtained. For other
goods—Irish and Canadian—the market is
firm, at a slight advance in price. Siberian
are still plentiful and offering at
good values. The Copenhagen quotation is
easily unchanged for next week. We re-
port today's values as follows: Choicest
Canadian creamery, in 56½ boxes, 109½d to
112½d per cwt; average, 108½d to 110½d;
best, 115d to 118d; choicest Russian and
Siberian, 25 to 28d; choicest, 102d to 108d;
secondary qualities, chiefly aged Austria,
106d to 112d; choicest States creamery,
States process creamery, States India,
imitation creameries and Canadian dairies,
none.

TORONTO.
Toronto, Oct. 7.—On the basis of the ad-
vance in Winnipeg, local holders of Mani-
toba wheat were asking \$1.15; for No. 1
northern, with bids at \$1.15. The futures
in Chicago were scarcely less pro-
nounced buyers offering \$1.15 and willing to
accept a few white, red or mixed.

The continued strength of barley is one of the
remarkable features of the market. No. 2
barley was wanted at 72¢, an advance of 14¢ on
the basis of two weeks ago. Oats advanced 1¢,
with bids and offers up to the same ex-
tent. Quotations as follows:
