Says He Was Dupe of Third The Daughters of Empire Who Party Who Planned the Abduction.

That the threats of a double suicide made by Mrs. Boyle last night were not mere idle words was shown today, when it became known that a razor, which had been secreted in his clothing, was taken from Boyle today, and that Mrs. Boyle had taken what she said was "enough morphine to kill two people."

The morphine was taken between midnight and daylight. She was rendered partly unconscious during the night, and was very sick this morning. t is believed that it was the effect of the morphine which caused her to collapse in the courtroom.

Boyle's Story. Boyle gave out a statement today marked "by James Boyle," in which he tells of an alleged murder at Youngstown, Ohio, several years ago, of Dan Reeble, jun. He tells of the finding of Reeble's body on the sidewalk, and says:


