Dairy stuff was not greatly in evidence today, though there was a very strong demand. Butter continues to be easter, and eggs were selling at 30e to 35e a dozen. There is quite a pronounced increase in the demand, owing to the fact that the supply of stored eggs is beginning to be exhausted.

Poultry remains the same, with very fittle being offered.

There was quite a supply of vegetables, mostly potatoes and cabbages, but the sale was not very brisk, and there was no change in prices. Apples, too, were guite plentiful, but found a very slow sale.
