SIDE LIGHTS ON
MANY SPORTSEEL'S WINNINGS INCREASED
WHEN PROTEST IS SUSTAINED

Sir R. Was Distanced in First Heat But Was Allowed to Continue in Race—Board of Review Awards Race to The Eel When Entricken Protests.

New York, Dec. 5.—The board of review of the National Trotting Association adjourned tonight until next May, putting over until that time a number of cases. The cases decided today included a fine of \$200 against the Blair County Road Driving Association of Altoona, Pa., and the expelling of five timekeepers for suppressing the records of time in a race; suspension of the Santa Clara County Fair Association, of San Jose, Cal., for failure to pay premiums after a race; and revocation of a \$200 fine levied upon Walter R. Cox, of Dover, N. H., for the alleged "laying up" of Anne Kohle in a heat at Buffalo.

Eel Decision Upheld.
F. W. Entricken, of Taviestock, Ont., owner of The Eel, who protested against a race won by Sir R. at Hartford, Conn., this year, was upheld. He claimed that, though Sir R. was distanced in one heat, he was allowed by the judges to start again. The result was that Sir R. eventually won the race, which would have gone to The Eel had the rules not been violated. The board sustained the protest, finding the allegations to be correct. The purse awarded to Sir R. was ordered to be returned to the National Association, and will be paid to Mr. Entricken, though The Eel has since died. Sir R. was one of Tommy Murphy's stable.
Postal Elected a Member.
Fred Postal, of Detroit, Mich., was elected a member of the western district

board of review, to succeed W. W. Collier, also of Detroit, who resigned. One of the most important cases was that of Anna Ax Me, O. H. Shole, of Holyoke, Col., was charged by L. C. Kenney, of Hastings, Neb., and four other horsemen, with entering the bay ally Anna Ax Me, as a 3-year-old, when it was contended the horse was nearer 5 years old. The board, after listening to eloquent pleas by attorneys for both sides, dismissed the complaint against Shole. Anna Ax Me during the last year won a number of the biggest racing races in the country, including the Kentucky Futurity, the Horsemen's Futurity at Detroit, the Horse Review Futurity at Columbus, Ohio, and the Futurity at Rockingham Park, Salem, New Hampshire. The protest against the mare was made after the Detroit and Kentucky meetings, and consequently the winnings of the mare, amounting to about \$3,000 for the two races, have been held up since the protest. By the decision of the board Mr. Shole can now collect his money.

YAMADA GETS REVENGE.
Philadelphia, Dec. 6.—Kodji Yamada, the Japanese billiardist, turned the tables on George Slosson, who defeated him on Monday night, when he won last night's game in the 18.2 ball line billiard tournament, 400 to 160. Slosson's highest run was 41, while the Jap had runs of 91, 87 and 65. Slosson's average was 8.19, and Yamada's 21.19.

Ernie Shaw Is Elected Manager and Bill Gough Is Secretary-Treasurer.

The Y. M. C. A. senior basketball team was formed at a meeting held in the Y. M. C. A. last evening. Ernie Shaw was elected manager of the team and William Gough was elected secretary-treasurer. The first game will be played with Woodstock College, on the 15th or the 17th, the dates being uncertain, owing to the fact that the College team have not yet decided on which night they will come. The Y. M. C. A. team will enter the O. B. A. intermediate series again this season, and endeavor to bring the championship to London. Last year they went into the finals with Toronto Central, and were only beaten out by a few points. The O. B. A. will hold an organization meeting in Toronto on Dec. 21 and the local club will have a representative at the meeting. The Meads will also enter a team in this league.

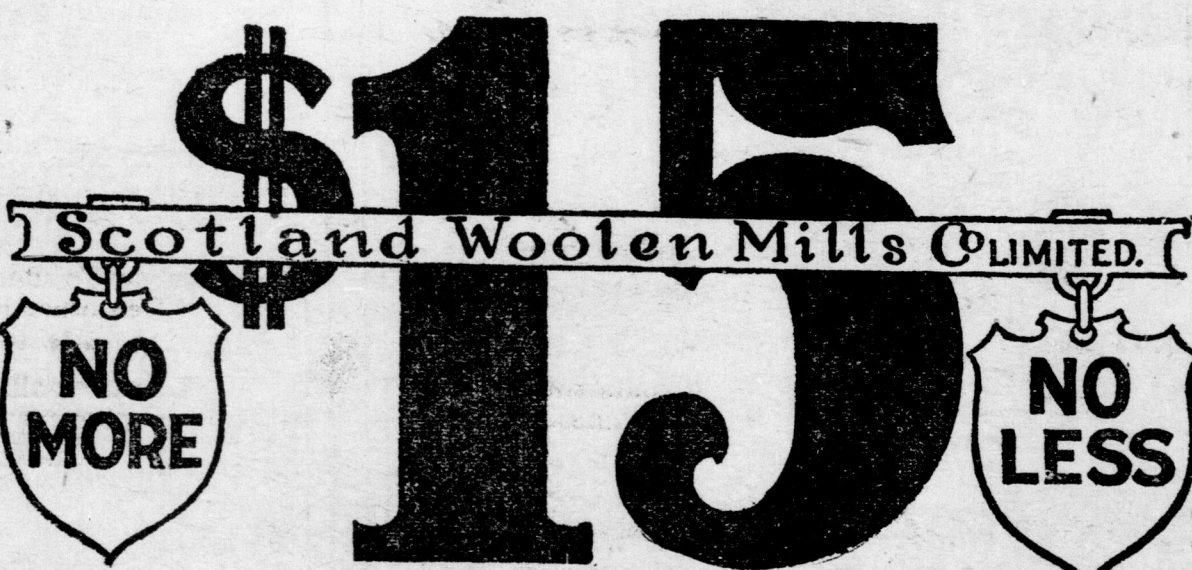
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
