PRETTY GOOD PROFITS

Buy Hundredweight of Sugar

For \$6.40—Make \$1.60

On Purchase.

According to one local wholesale

grocer, who is well posted on the sub-

ject, the Government at Ottawa will

undoubtedly put a duty of one cent a

pound on unrefined sugar from the

States.

A number of Canadian refineries have

been buying the raw sugar in New York

paying \$4.11 per hundredweight for it,

causing the price in New York to jump.

This is a higher price than the same

refineries are paying in Canada.

"I look to see the price of sugar ad-

vance to eight cents a pound, whole-

sale, by summer," declared the grocer.
