38 C. T. A. CONVICTIONS
North Huron Inspector Makes Interesting Report for Two Years.

WINGHAM, June 20.—License Inspector J. J. Mitchell of North Huron has just completed his report for the year, and from this report the following will be of interest to those who are interested in law enforcement.

Since May 1, 1913, Mitchell has handled 52 cases and secured 38 convictions; 5 cases were withdrawn and 6 cases dismissed; there are also 3 cases pending.

The inspector asks for the co-operation of all citizens in having the Canada temperance act strictly enforced throughout North Huron.

Pte. Arthur Dean, whose name is mentioned as one of the wounded in the casualty list, enlisted in London, and resided with Albert Higges, 884 Waterloo street. Pte. Dean was a member of G. Company, 7th Fusiliers, during his last tour of duty.

An employee of the Ontario Spring Bed and Mattress Company, this is the second time that Dean has been wounded since the outbreak of the war. His parents were notified from Ottawa recently of his condition.

FIVE BLENHEIM MEN KILLED OR WOUNDED.

BLENHEIM, June 20.—Word has been received by friends and relatives of the first five Englishmen who went to the war from this town that all of them have been either killed or wounded. They were:

Frederick Wilkinson, a reservist, who received word at the outbreak of the war to report, as he belonged to an Essex regiment in England. He has since been reported killed in action.

John Coford, another reservist, who belonged to a Sussex regiment, was called to report at the same time. He has since been reported killed.

Joe Ling, the last reported, is another old country lad who went from here. He is reported wounded in the thigh.

All of these had come out to make their homes here, but when the call to arms came their love for country took them to help the flag.

CHATHAM CAPTAIN AND LANCE-CORP. FALL.

A little over a year ago Lieut. Robinson was employed on the staff of Hay Co. of Woodstock, as accountant, and during his residence at Woodstock he was a member of the 22nd Regiment, where he was quite popular.

LIEUT. JOHN McDONALD REPORTED MISSING.

STRATFORD, June 20.—Sergeant McDonald of the armies today received official word from Ottawa that his son, Lieut. John McDonald, was missing following the recent severe fighting. Lieut. In that battalion he was popular with officers and men, and in shooting held the record of making a possible 100. He is a veteran of the South African campaign, and in the present war has charge of a machine gun, several of the Harristons men being members of the company, who all commend him for bravery as a soldier.

PTE. MERCER OF YORK ST. MISSING.
Mrs. Martha Mercer, 10 York street, has been notified officially from Ottawa that her son, Pte. John Carson Mercer, who went to England with the first contingent as a member of the 48th Highlanders of Toronto, and who afterwards was transferred to the 48th Highlanders, of Toronto, before proceeding to the front, was among the missing between April 24 and April 29.

The war already has taken one of Mrs. Mercer's sons, Robert H., who was killed while assisting in an attempt to capture Canadian guns out of a position where they were in danger of being captured by the Germans. He was a married man, and lived at 7 Bathurst street.

The news that John was missing, Mrs. Mercer said today, came rather in the nature of a relief to her. She feels that if he had been killed the authorities would have known before now, and she is hopeful, therefore, that he is alive and a prisoner of war. As she had not heard from him since April 27, she had begun to fear the worst.

CONGREGATIONALIST DROPPED FROM PULPIT
