"N. G." CHECK MAN WANTED IN LONDON; IN ST. THOMAS NOW
Admits in Port Stanley Lack of Bank Funds.

ST. THOMAS, June 20.—A guest at the Invererie Hotel, Port Stanley, for the past few days, giving the name of E. T. Wright, tendered a check for his bill today for \$40 on the Bank of Toronto at St. Thomas. After deducting the amount due, Proprietor Kingston gave him \$20 in change.

A few minutes later, a man from London happened in the hotel and informed the hotel proprietor that the man was wanted by the London police for passing a fraudulent check in that city. Mr. Kingston charged the fellow with giving him a fictitious check in that city. He took a car for St. Thomas.

The police at this place were notified by telephone and arrested him upon the arrival of the car. When searched, letters were found on him addressed to Raymond of St. Thomas. He was brought before Squire Hunt for examination Sunday night and remanded until Wednesday.

The authorities in London also want him.

38 C. T. A. CONVICTIONS
North Huron Inspector Makes Interesting Report for Two Years.

WINGHAM, June 20.—License Inspector J. J. Mitchell of North Huron has just completed his report for the year, and from this report the following will be of interest to those who are interested in law enforcement.

Since May 1, 1913, Mr. Mitchell has handled 52 cases and secured 38 convictions; 5 cases were withdrawn and 6 cases dismissed; there are also 3 cases pending.

The inspector asks for the co-operation of all citizens in having the Canada temperance act strictly enforced throughout North Huron.

"FOR THE BENEFIT AND ENJOYMENT OF THE PEOPLE."
On April 24, 1908, Theodore Roosevelt, president of the United States at that time, dedicated the Yellowstone Park "for the benefit and enjoyment of the people," so that it might be preserved to afford a means of enjoyment and education to the American public.

It is situated at an altitude of 4,600 feet, and is at once the largest and most picturesque national park in the world, being almost half as large again as the Yellowstone Park to the south. It has been justly named the Sportsman's Paradise, as every known outdoor sport may be indulged in here. These contemplative visits to the Pacific Coast railway, the coming summer cannot afford to miss a reservation of some 5,723 square miles in extent, embraces parts of the valleys of the Bow, Spray and Cascade rivers, Lake Minnewanka and several noble mountain ranges. 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
