Board of Health and Works So Decide.

SYSTEM IS ANTIQUATED Work Will Not Be Begun This Year for Lack of Funds.

That a sewage-disposal plant will have to be provided at the farm west of the city was the result of a conference held last night between the board of health and the board of works.

The joint committee discussed the report of the provincial board. The latter claimed that 70 per cent of the sewage of the city was dumped into the river in a raw state.

Board To Be Notified. These errors or omissions will be brought to the attention of the provincial board, and the report will have to be corrected in this way.

Method Antiquated. The method of treating the sewage was found to be antiquated. The bacteria beds have long since failed to do their work.
