SENATE SLASHES ALMOST IN TWO AMOUNT FOR RELIEF OF DEPOSITORS, HEAVY LOSERS MUST ARGUE CLAIMS

Would Pay Three Million Instead of \$5,450,000 Passed by Commons.

GIVES 35 PER CENT

Ready Aid For Small Depositors Only—Number 47,000.

MANY ARE EXCLUDED

Churches, Organizations, Municipalities, Senators, Members of Parliament Barred.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, June 19.—The Home Bank bill, as it received third reading in the Senate tonight, widely differs from the measure passed by the House of Commons. In fact, during the Senate discussion it was termed a new bill.

Amendments to the bill provides for a reduction of the amount to be paid for relief from \$5,450,000 to \$3,000,000.

The amendments, which were the result of all-day deliberations of a Senate committee, limits the outright payments to 35 per cent of all deposits up to \$500. Claims for reimbursement on deposits of more than \$500 are to be heard by the president of the exchequer court of Canada, who would act personally as a commissioner and determine the

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How Bank Bill Changed When Carved In Senate

The main changes in the Home Bank bill as passed by the Senate are:

(1) The total amount of reimbursement is reduced from \$5,450,000 to \$3,000,000.

(2) Deposits not exceeding \$500 are to be reimbursed outright to the extent of 35 per cent of the claim without investigation by the commissioner.

(3) Claims for reimbursement on deposits of more than \$500 will be heard by the president or pulse judge of the exchequer court, who, as commissioner, will make awards, not exceeding 35 per cent of the deposit in cases where "special need" is proven.

(4) The bill denies any moral responsibility on the part of the government.

(5) The following are excluded entirely from the benefits of the bill: directors of the Home Bank, senators and members of the House of Commons, the government of any province, city, town, county, municipality, parish, school board, educational institution or other similar corporation or institution; any corporation, association, society, partnership, club, friendly or mutual benefit society, religious or church corporation, labor association or similar organization or association.

(6) Any creditor failing to take advantage of the act within twelve months of its passing will be barred from receiving any benefit under it.

(7) The minister of finance must annually submit to parliament, within 14 days of the opening of the session, a detailed statement showing the names of all persons who have received aid under the act and the amount.

entire amount to be paid to such claimants. In such cases, need must be shown. The judgment of the commissioner would be final.

Exclude Many.

The senate amendments exclude from any payment, past or present, directors of the Home Bank, provincial governments, municipalities, school boards and other similar organizations; religious, church, or labor organizations; senators and members of parliament would also be entirely excluded from the operation of the bill.

Senator Beique reading the proposed amendments estimated that it would require slightly more than \$1,000,000 to meet the deposits up to \$500. It had been stated by the liquidator, in evidence before the committee in the morning, that there were some 47,000 depositors whose accounts were less than \$500.

The amendments also provide that the commissioner should report from time to time to the liquidator of the bank as to the findings which he has made and the amounts paid to each. The parliament at the beginning of each session the names and addresses of those to whom payments had been made and the amounts paid to each.

In reply to questions, Senator Beique said that the liquidator had estimated that between \$2,500,000 and \$3,000,000 would be approximately required to meet the claim stipulated in the amended bill.

Not Responsible. Senator Beique, in further outlining the provisions of the amended bill, said that under it parliament would not be recognizing any moral responsibility. Senator Gideon Robertson asked on what principle the sub-committee had ruled out the claims of such organizations as labor organizations. "The principle is," replied Senator Beique, "that the amount of the loss by each member of these organizations will be small." The principle of the amended bill, he added, would be a matter of fact, rule out such organizations without the specific clause, because the claimants in the case of deposits over \$500 had to show "need."

TELLS M'MILLAN TO CLAIM REGIONS

Governor Makes Announcement at Dinner Given in Honor of Explorer.

Southport, Maine, June 19.—Governor Ralph O. Brewster, of Maine, tonight authorized Donald B. MacMillan, who sails for the Arctic tomorrow, to claim any territory he may discover in the Polar regions for the state of Maine.

He made this announcement at Newagen Inn at a dinner in honor of the explorer, which was attended by many persons prominent in state and national affairs.

Governor Brewster himself arranged for the dinner, and in view of recent press despatches, announcing Canada's attitude toward the United States in the matter of claiming a territory discovered by the MacMillan expedition, his announcement was heard with keen interest.

"By the well settled principles of international law," said Governor Brewster, "discovery is the primary incident in a claim to any land. If question shall ever arise to its title ample constitutional provision is made for its determination by the constitution."

"There appears to be nothing in the constitution over this state or nation in derogation of this inherent right of sovereignty of claimed land which it shall discover or explore."

"If question shall arise with foreign countries, their amicable adjustment in accordance with our constitution is assured by the peaceful experiences of a century with our neighbor on the north."

"The flag of the state of Maine may be planted on this territory, which there is much to indicate, may exist in that great space. It will then remain for the federal government to decide whether or not it will recognize and protect our rights."

RAILROAD DROPS CHEAP RATE PLAN

Spoils Ontario's Opportunity To Experiment With Fuel From Alberta.

Edmonton, June 19.—There will not be any movement of Alberta coal to Ontario markets this year under special freight rate agreements between the governments and the Canadian National Railways. Confirmation of this has been received by the Alberta government.

The difficulty lies in the inability of the railway to carry on along the lines proposed, and it is said here that the C. N. R. management will withdraw from the scheme. In that event there will not be any further effort to market Alberta coal in the east this year.

It is understood that the fact that the railway commission is about to begin a probe into the whole question of freight rates has something to do with the hesitancy of the railway company to go on with the scheme. Coupled with this is the fact that changes in the railway bill are pending in parliament, and in view of the uncertainty as to what will be the outcome, the C. N. R. has been finding it difficult to proceed with the Alberta arrangement, under which it was to move 25,000 tons of coal at a \$7 rate plus excess cost over an experimental basis. Premier Greenfield, who has been negotiating with Sir Henry Thornton, is in Montreal.

The belief here is that a knock out has been given or is about to be given to the coal shipping business that Alberta was hoping to build up in Ontario.

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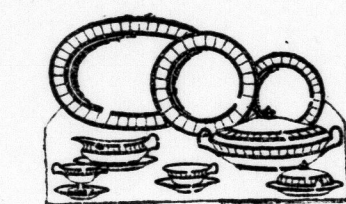
