ARRANGES FOR RENTAL OF SCHOOL AUDITORIUM

Secretary Tanner Declares Collegiate Space Can Be Used For Various Purposes.

Final regulations in connection with the use of the Central Collegiate auditorium have been drawn up by Secretary W. A. Tanner in conjunction with the principals of the colleges of the city, the rental of the space being fixed at \$15 per evening.

Rules governing the occupation of the rooms are not severe, but special emphasis is placed on the fact that students whenever the latter desire to make use of it at all times.

In addition to this regulation there is one that states no fees or remunerations are to be paid to the caretaker or any other employees of the board by the lessees. The fee for renting must be paid before or immediately after the night use.

It is also stated that as the building is unlicensed, no stated fee for admission to concerts or other functions is to be made.

Steps will now be taken to allot the use of the auditorium to some of the many organizations which have made application, several of these having been received within the past week.
