**WORST FOR YEARS.**

HELENA, MONT., Nov. 25.—The worst snow storm that has visited Montana for years is raging here and has been for the past 36 hours and shows no signs of abatement. Over a foot of snow has fallen already, tying up all the street car lines in Helena. The storm is general throughout the Northwest, and the snow is so deep that railroad traffic is seriously interfered with. The cold is extreme, the mercury ranging from 5 to 30 below zero.
