O'Donnell replied: "Don't blame me, I was sent to do it," whereupon the woman who was with him said: "Don't mind O'Donnell, you are no informer."

Cross-examination failed to shake Mrs. Carey's testimony. She denied that she had talked to her son about his evidence.
