#### Is the World Getting Better or Worse ?

An interesting bible lecture was delivered last Thursday evening in the Baptist church, Watford, by Rev. R. Stevenson, pastor of the Congregational church. His subject was "The Second Coming of Jesus Christ, and Subsequent Events." Although the night was dark and stormy, the church was well filled, and for the greater part of two hours the intelligent audience listened to one of the most interesting lectures ever delivered in Watford

audience listened to one of the most interesting lectures ever delivered in Watford on the above named subject.

Rev. Mr. Stevenson is a strong premillennialist. He believes that we are now living in the Laodicean period, the seventh division of the present dispensation of grace, and that we may any day expect the promised return of the Master to take His church from the earth. Mr. Stevenson's reasons for holding this belief are as follows:

First—The actual fulfillment of nearly

Stevenson's reasons for holding this belief are as follows:—

First—The actual fulfillment of nearly every prophecy regarding the time of the end, with one exception, namely—the preaching of the Gospel to every nation as a witness, and even this is rapidly being fulfilled.

Second—The alarming increase of moral wickedness in the world in these days. Almost every newspaper is full of accounts of wars, murders, suicides, divorces, fraud and crime of all kinds.

Third—The prevailing irreverence regarding the sanctity of the Sabbath Day the world over, especially among the young, together with the rapid increase of knowledge, and the great numbers of people who are travelling to and fro all the time, thus fulfilling the prophecy given in Daniel XII.: 4.

Fourth—The looseness and carelessness regarding true religion among pro-

rourth—The looseness and careless-ness regarding true religion among pro-fessed Christian people, and the worldly ways and means that are being adopted fot the carrying on of church work. Fifth—The spurious teachings that are being tolerated in many of our colleges and churches, and the rise of many sects

who are advocating doctrines that are of the devil and not of God. Sixth—The restless spirit prevailing among the nations of the world, together

with wars and rumors of wars.

Mr. Stevenson is no pessimist, nor advocate of war, but he believes that the universal peace notion that prevails among many people, and that is being taught in our Sunday school lessons, is a flat contradiction of true scriptural teaching. "There can be no universal peace," says Mr. Stevenson, "so long as Satan is the prince of the power of the air," and the god of this world." He is insinuating his coils in these days among the sons of men and prompting them to war with one another, even as he did of old sons of men and prompting them to war with one another, even as he did of old among the sons of God, when he influenced them to rebel against the monarchy of Heaven. Universal peace will only be realised among the nations of the world after the Great Tribulation period is over, when Christ comes and binds the great enemy of peace, Satan, and casts him into the pit. God's great purpose in this age is to gather out of the nations of the world a 'peculiar' people who will constitute the true spiritual church, 'The Bride of Christ,' whom He will claim when He comes. This gathering is accomplished meantime by the preaching of the Gospel, and the working of the accomplished meantime by the preaching of the Gospel, and the working of the Holy Spirit in the hearts of men and women, but nowhere in Scripture are we told that all the world will come under the sway of Christ in this age. This will certainly not meet with the warm approval of those who have been hugging to themselves the pet idea that the world is surely growing better, and that the day will soon dawn when the nations will study the art of war no more.

But objections to the above mentioned

truth are usually found to be strongest among those who have not studied careamong those who have not studied carefully the subject for themselves, and anything that tends to upset the general opinion they held is regarded as something akin to heresay. A careful study, however, of the sayings of Christ and the Apostles and Prophets will convince the intelligent and unbiassed Christian mind that the closing days of this age are to be that the closing days of this age are to be the worst, and that the long-spoken of and looked-for Golden Age of peace will not come until the great destroyer of peace has been removed. This will take place when Jesus comes again. There is nothing whatever of Millennial Dawnism, nor anything pertaining to it in this

place when Jesus comes again. There is nothing whatever of Millennial Dawnism, nor anything pertaining to it in this belief; it is the pure, unadulterated teaching of God's Holy Word."

Rev. Mr. Stevenson is no mere prophecy monger, nor dealer in bare speculation, and he abhors anything that is merely sensational, but he believes that nearly every Christian man and woman should take more interest in the study of prophecy than they are doing. He has given the subject a deep study himself for years, especially the Book of Revelation, and he feels free to urge all Christians to follow his example. He believes that the person who studies the last book of the Bible with the earnest intention of finding out the true meaning, will become the happy recipient of the promised blessing mentioned in Rev. I. 3, "Blessed is he that readeth, and they that hear the words of this prophecy, and keep those things which are written therein, for the time is at hand."—Com.
