In opposition to him the democrats have nominated a candidate who is not only per-sonally very popular with his party, but who has also taken a prominent part in shaping the tariff reform policy which has characterized the democratic party in national politics during the last few years. As the political father of the famous Mc Kinley tariff, the present governor is looked upon as the special representative and patron of protection, while his opponent is consid-ered, on the other hand, the representative of the democratic policy of tariff reform. of the democratic policy of tariff reform. The approaching contest will therefore be fought out largely on the old lines of free trade, or tariff reform, versus protection. Newspapers and politicians are already re-ferring to it as " the last battle over protec-tion." The fight promises to be an interest-ing one and is already attracting a great deal of attention. Since Mr. McKinley made himself famous by his connection with the present tariff his elections have been events of national im-portance, being watched with the keenest interest all over the union. In the first election after that measure was passed, his opponents, thinking to prove the unporp-larity of the McKinley tariff, made a deal set upon his congressional district and de-feated him.
