LESSON III.

THE PREACHING OF JOHN THE BAPTIST January 21, 1900

Luke 3: 1-17. (May be used as a Temperance Lesson.) Commit to memory vs. 3-6. Read Mal. 3: 1-7 and 4: 1-6.

1 Now in the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Cae'sar, Pon'tius Pl'late being governor of Judæ'a, and Her od being tetrarch of Gal'liee, and his brother Phil'ip tetrarch of I Yturæ a and of the region of Trachoni'tis, and Lysa'nias the tetrarch of A'bile'ne, 2 2 An'mas and Cai'aphas being the high priests, the word of God came unto John the son of Zachari'as in the wilderness.

3 And he came into all the scountry about Jor dan, preaching the baptism of repentance 4 for the remis-

4 As it is written in the book of the words of 5 Esni'as the prophet, 5 saying. The voice of one crying in the wilderness, 7 Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.
5 Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be brought low; and the crooked shall be made straight, and 5 the rough ways shall be made

6 And all flesh shall see the salvation of God.
7 Then said he to the multitude that came forth
to be baptized of him, 10 O generation of vipers, who

hath warned you to flee from the wrath to come?

8 Bring forth therefore fruits worthy of repentance, and hegin not to say within yourselves, We have A braham to our father: for I say unto you, That God is able of these stones to raise up children unto A'braham.

9 And 11 now also the axe is laid unto the root of the trees: every tree therefore which bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire. 19 And the 12 people asked him, saying, 15What shall

we do then?

11 He answereth and saith unto them, He that hath two coats, let him impart to him that hath none; and he that hath 4 meat, let him do likewise.

12 Then came also publicans to be baptized, and said unto him, Master, what shall we do?

13 And he said unto them, 15 Exact no more than

that which is appointed you.

14 And 16 the soldiers likewise demanded of him, saying, And 17 what shall we do? And he said unto them, Do violence to no man, neither 18 accuse any

falsely; and be content with your wages.

15 And as the people were in expectation, and all men 19 mused in their hearts of John, whether he were

the Christ, or not; 16 John answered, saying unto them all, I indeed baptize you with water; but 20 one mightie: than I cometh, the latchet of whose shoes I am not worthy to unloose: he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost

and with fire:

17 Whose fan is in his hand, 21 and he will throughly purge his floor, and will gather the wheat into his garner; but the chaff he will 22 burn with fire unquenchable.

EXPLANATION

Connection—The lesson tells of Christ's forerunner. He was cousin to Jesus, and had lived much in the wilderness alone with God.

1-3. Tiberius Cæsar; the Roman Em-Pontius Pilate; who afterwards peror. This was his condemned Christ to death. first year as governor. Herod; Herod Antipas, the son of the Herod who slew the children of Bethlehem. Tetrarch; literally, a ruler of "a fourth part": used for petty monarchs under the Roman rule. was the rightful high priest. Caiaphas had been put in his place. The word of God. John was divinely inspired. The baptism of repentance; John's baptism symbolized cleansing. (Ezek. 36: 25, 26.) Repentance means a thorough change of mind and action with respect to sin.
