## NATURAL SYMBOL OF THE RESURRECTION.

I WATCHED last summer with wonder and admiration the changes which the butterfly undergoes before it attains to its winged state. First, there was a clumsy, slowly moving worm, confined to the plant on which it fed. It had no eyes apparently, and could only feel its Its feet were the rudest stumps.
