of material one is producing, whether it be new oil, old oil, gas or what have you, and depending on the province in which it is produced. What is more interesting about that 8 per cent tax is that it is non-deductible for income tax purposes except, of course, if the company is a foreign multinational. A foreign multinational company can deduct that 8 per cent from the income of the parent company in the United States.

It is interesting that this great document which talks about Canadianization states that Canadian companies will not be able to deduct the 8 per cent royalty for income tax purposes, but that foreign companies may make the deduction. What genius dreamed that one up? It is absolutely absurd. It must have been the same genius who wrote this line, which is a dandy:

While the Government of Canada is determined to increase Canadian ownership and control, it does not wish the result to be increased concentration of power in the hands of a few large . . . companies. Competition is the lifeblood of the industry, and the consumer's best protection. . . Therefore, the government will be vigilant about ownership trends in the industry.

The government will ensure competition in the public sector by creating perhaps two or three additional companies. Here is the sentence:

To ensure competition in the public sector, the government may establish one or more new Crown corporations to hold the assets acquired, rather than adding them all to Petro-Canada.

Is that not a dandy definition of competition? Instead of having just one Crown corporation at the minister's beck and call, he is going to have two or three and thereby have competition. There will be competition by having three toys to play with rather than one. If this were not so serious, it would be laughable.

Judging from the results achieved to date by Petro-Canada, it is also an effective way of encouraging the rapid energy development necessary to meet our security needs.
