OTTAWA, Nov. 19.—That the Ro-man Catholic Church is paying more attention to the civilization and edu-cation of the Indians than are other re-ligious denominations is shown by the report of the department of Indian af-fairs, which was made public today. There are 120 Roman Catholic schools of various kinds, day, industrial and boarding, for the Indian thruout Can-ada. The Anglicans come next with 93; the Methodists have 45 and the Presbyterians only 15. There are 50 un-denominational schools.


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-AND THE WOR ST IS YET TO COME
