LARGE TIMBER LIMIT PURCHASE

Kilgour Shives, of Campbellton, N. B., is reported to have purchased from the Muskoka Lumber Company, of Toronto, all their Crown timber limits in the Provinces of Quebec and New Brunswick, amounting to about 100 square miles in Quebec and 470 square miles in New Brunswick. Mr. Shives formerly owned 387 square miles in these provinces, and this purchase makes him the largest holder of Crown lands in New Brunswick.

CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

ONTARIO.

Varying opinions are expressed regarding the lumber market. Manufacturers are perfectly satisfied with the volume of business, white dealers frequently express some disappointment. Those who expect ed and depended upon a heavy local demand have not witnessed a realization of their anticipations, but it is probable h at the activity in the lumber business for the past year led them to expect too much In any case, retail dealers state that they could handle a larger volume of trade without increasing their facilities.

vast quantity of white pine that has been bought for export has placed manufacturers in a position somewhat independent of local trade so 'ar as the better grades are concerned, but they must still look to the home market to consume a large proportion of the lower quality. Almost every pine manufacturer has sold all the lumber that he can manufacture within the next sixty days, and several have contracted for their entire output. So long as the demand from the United States continues in its present volume, there is not likely to be a perceptible weakening of prices. Dry hardwood stocks are low. The necessity of providing piling ground for the new cut has resulted in forced sales at lower prices in one or two cases, but the market generally is strong and likely to advance as the light production of this year becomes more generally recognized: Buyers are in the market for shingles of all kinds and those having a stock in shipping condition can realize very readily. Hemlock is being bought as vigorously as ever, in some cases as a substitute for white pine.

QUEBEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

The improvement in the demand for spruce lumber has been encouraging to manufacturer and shippers. It has been difficult to convince buyers in Great Britain that the quantity of stock available for that market this year will be comparatively small, but the recent advance in prices seems to indicate a recognition, at last, of the conditions existing in the eastern provinces. The log supply is still uncertain. One week ago it was reported that 30,000,000 feet of logs were hung up on the St. John river. Since that time some rain has fallen, which has improved the prospects of getting the logs to the mills, but even if the log supply is sufficient for a full season s operations, there will not be an abnormal quantity manufactured for the British markei, as the Eastern States is taking spruce clapboards and other lumber very freely,
