"The thing of first importance to send to the boys who are prisoners," he said, "is food. In some camps they practically live on the boxes which they receive. Such was the case at the Prussian camp at Schwarmstead. If that camp isn't famous in Canada now, it is going to be when some of the officers I met there come home. Built on a moor, with water six feet below the surface that smelt putrid, it was infested by fleas in the summer time. The food was impossible to eat. We were told in going there we would be treated as Prussian recruits. All the arrangements were most annoying and the buildings uncomfortable.
