RUSS REDS ESCAPE

St. Petersburg, May 6. - A plot which resulted in the liberation of thirteen political prisoners was daringly executed at Alexandroviky yesterday during the Easter services at the prison, where high mass was being celebrated in the prison chapel. Under cover of the confusion which followed thirteen political prisoners, including several prominent terrorists, escaped.

John Redmond has not been an idle spectator in these negotiations, but has taken a prominent part in them and been given every opportunity to state his views, which, needless to say, were at first a demand for the fullest measure of self-government.
