

IN CITY INTERESTS TO KEEP LINE OPEN SAY COMMISSIONERS

Operators of L. and P. S. Are
Against 60-Cent Price.

NO RECOMMENDATION
Express Willingness To Pre-
pare Report If One Asked
by Council.

The London Railway Commission, at a meeting held on Monday, decided against any recommendation to the city council that the London and Lake Erie Railway (Tramway line) be purchased by the city at 60 cents on the dollar. The commission expressed its willingness to give any further information the council desired.

When the communication was read from City Clerk Barker, Sir Adam Beck opened the discussion. "The document is vague," said Sir Adam. "We have no offer to consider. There is no price set on the line. We have nothing excepting definite. I only know what I saw in the newspaper. What does the council want to know? Does it want a valuation at scrap or as a going concern?"

"The council wants to say that we consider the road to be worth," said Sir Adam. "The price is not what the offer or proposition is," said Sir Adam. "We should have something definite. I only know what I saw in the newspaper."

"The council apparently wants to know whether or not we will buy the road at scrap value," commented Sir Adam. "Possibly the aldermen would like our opinion as to what we consider the road worth to the city."

"I presume we can accept the statements in the press that the company wants us to pay 60 cents on the dollar on the bonds issued," continued Sir Adam. "I would not recommend that," said Sir Adam. "The price is not what the offer or proposition is."

"It is undoubtedly the city's interest to keep the road open," commented Sir Adam. "It is an asset to the city. We cannot pay that price, when we could not get returns for our money."

"Let St. Thomas purchase the road," declared Mayor Stevenson. "We have no objection to it. We don't want any more."

"Certainly it is to London's interests to keep the road open," said Sir Adam. "It is a value to the city. I would not like to see it closed up. I think we should make a reasonable offer for the line. We would want to purchase it at a price that we could justify and that would give returns to the city for the investment."

"Sir Adam Beck explained the history of the former offer to buy the road at 60 cents on the dollar. The commission had investigated and could not make any better proposition than that. He was not prepared to make an offer now."

"Up to Council, Says Pocock." "We can go into the matter if the council desires, and give any information that is wanted on the present value of the road, and what we could do for it," said Sir Adam. "If the city then wants to purchase the road, it is up to the council to do so."

Must Appear at Mobilization
Centres Only.

MONDAY IS OPENING DAY
District Boards Will Com-

The bondholders of London and Lake Erie Railway and Transportation Company, known for more than twelve years to Londoners as the Traction line, now has a chance to get out of the railway business, and "get out clean."

Immediately following the announcement that the road would be "scrapped" and sold in the open market at the best price obtainable for materials, offers were received for the entire equipment of steel rails. This has caused steel to rise to a high figure, and while copper has gone down through regulation, copper wire brings a premium because of the shortage of deliveries.

The Traction line has thousands of tons of steel and copper, and sufficient money would be realized from the sale, taken with the amounts that could be realized from the sale of the road, to enable the bondholders to secure for the bondholders an amount close approximating the break-even point.

When the London and Lake Erie Railway was electrified, the bondholders of the Traction line, who had secured the line as a business enterprise, had no immediate chance to dispose of the road, even had they cared to do so, believing that business enough to pay bond interest and to keep the road in proper shape could be made. At present they feel that in the course of a few years, the road will be sold for a price that will enable them to pay the bond interest.
