Some of these had purchased property at from \$2,000 to \$4,000 and only paid a small amount down on their agreements, and there was no guarantee, declared the solicitor, that the purchasers will carry out the terms of the agreement, Those of the veterans who can produce their deeds will be given the benefit of the act.

The city solicitor was not impressed with the opinion of Attorney-General Raney.



"As an actual fact," stated Mr. James, "The large distributing companies supplied by the Union Gas Company such as the Chatham Gas Company and the Windsor Gas Company retain one-third of the amount which they receive for the sale of gas as their share for distributing it. Therefore, the offer, which Mr. Ness states, was made by the Union Gas Company of 10 cents per thousand feet is, according to all established precedent, more than generous.

CAUSE DROP IN STOCK PRICES

New York Quotations Touch Lowest Point in Many Months.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Quotations today touched the lowest point in many months on the stock exchange. News that the Russian Soviet Government has rejected the terms for a truce with Poland caused heavy sell-ing, and prices were forced down rapidly in the early trading, although there were partial recoveries later.


