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C.P.R. CONDUCTOR LOSES SON WHILE VISITING

Big Gathering of Orangemen in West Toronto—Results of Entrance Exams.

WEST TORONTO, July 12.—The home of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Hiron, 80 Cawthra-avenue, is in mourning today, as the result of a sad accident which occurred Saturday afternoon in which their little twelve-year-old son, Norman, was killed. The little boy for some time past had been visiting at the home of his uncle, William McMaster, in the Township of Essex, about three miles from Angus. Yesterday afternoon the boy went over to Reginald Lee's farmhouse, nearby, in search of his uncle. Mr. Lee happened to be at the bottom of a well in the yard, into which pipes had been connected a few days ago. The well, which is 60 feet deep, is dry just now on account of the repairs done to the pipes, and the boy proceeded to climb down the ladders to visit Mr. Lee. Seeing the lad's danger, Mr. Lee ordered him back and he had got to

about 10 feet from the top when the braces down below gave way, and the ladder on which he was standing toppled over. The little fellow's head struck the pipe about 50 feet below, inflicting terrible scalp wounds and fracture of the skull. Death was instantaneous. The body arrived this afternoon at his parent's home in West Toronto. Mr. Hiron is a conductor on the C.P.R. The funeral will take place on Tuesday at 2 p.m. to Prospect Cemetery.

There are 35 cars of stock in the Union Stock Yards for to-morrow's market. A jay horse found straying around the streets last night was brought by the police to Wm. Maher's livery stable on Keele-street.

The parade of the District Orange Lodge this afternoon to the service in St. John's Episcopal Church was the largest of its kind ever held in West Toronto. About 400 brethren were in line, headed by the West Toronto Pipe and Drum Band. J. C. Boylen, district master, officiated. The lodges taking part in the procession were: Loyal Orange Lodges No. 602 and 900, Lambton, L.O.L., Runnymede L.O.L., Royal Black Preceptory, True Blues and Knights of St. John and Malta.

Headed by the band, the Knights of St. John and Malta, many of whom came from Toronto, paraded up Dundas-street from Royce-avenue and joined the procession at St. James' Hall. The sermon was preached by the rector, Rev. T. Beverley Smith. The musical selections by the choir were especially commendable, and each of the members was presented with an "Orange Favor." The offering was devoted to the choir fund of the church. The text chosen was 1 Thessalonians v. 31: "Prove all things, hold fast that which is good."

"The truths for which the Orange Order stands," remarked Mr. Smith, "are those for which the Reformation stood. One of the most important of these is the right of private judgment, and our text asserts this right. It is to the lady that St. Paul is writing, and upon matters of doctrine. Nevertheless he says: 'Prove all things; of which the principle is: Prove all by

God's truth. Yes, prove all preaching, doctrine teaching, opinion, and practices by the Word of God. That which cannot stand the test, reject; and this is private judgment. You are not to believe a thing because it is asserted by popes or cardinals, bishops or priests, churches, conferences or synods. Prove all things by the Word of God." In the West Toronto League games on Saturday the Bankers sprang a surprise on the All-Stars by defeating them 10 to 2.
