

THREE MEN SENT DIRECT TO ARMY

Eleven Who Failed to Report
Taken by Military
Police.

BOARDS WORK QUICKLY

Some Had Quota of Cases
Heard Before
Noon.

Some of the tribunals working under the Military Service Act have got their swiftness more quickly than others, and as a consequence there is a great difference in the time taken in hearing the cases allotted. Yesterday several of the tribunals had disposed of all their business before noon, while others took the whole day until five o'clock to complete their hearings.

Several of the tribunals are awaiting precedents. Some of the cases which come before them are difficult to decide, and in several cases the tribunals defer decision until it is seen how others are dealing with similar cases.

Eleven men who had failed to report for service to the army, were taken before tribunals yesterday and were given exemption. Three of these were in class A, and these were immediately drafted into the army. The men other than those of class A were taken before tribunals 349, in which Judge Costworth and William Lee sat, and were given exemptions until their classes were called out.

Claude T. Stott, an Anglican divinity student, Trinity College, appeared before tribunal 350 to claim exemption. He said he would be willing to serve if his church would agree to his ordination before he finished his present course at the beginning of April. Exemption was refused in this case. Mr. Henslow, remarking that it was strange the Church of England would not do as other churches.

Nine men in class A appeared yesterday before tribunals 349 and each one got exemption. It is understood that the military representative will file appeals in several of the cases.

"The number of young men who are proving that they have just reasons for staying at home, a very high percentage being physically unfit, and many of the women having larger families to support than lots of married men, does away with the belief which has been prevalent in Toronto that there are many slackers in this city," said one of the members of tribunals 350 yesterday.
