# WHEAT SHARPLY RUNS UPGRADE

Activity of Chicago Export Houses Carries Market Forward.

### ARGENTINE PRICES UP

Market Closes Unsettled With Values Over Two Points Higher.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Activity of export houses in absorbing offerings carried the wheat market today sharply upgrade, the rise amounting in some cases at one time to as much as 5 \$ 3. Prices cloved unsettled, 2 1-4 to 2 7-5 net higher with Docember at \$1.87 to \$1.87 3-8, and May at \$1.88 3-4 to \$1.89. Corn gained 1-4 to 1-2c, oats 5-8 to 7-8c, and provisions 7 to 22c.

Despite intense interest in election results, the course of prices in the wheat trade seemed to depend chiefly, if ret altogether, on non-political factors. The upward tendency of the market was shown as soon as trading began, and was ascribed in large measure to a falling off in the European crop advices. In this connection, special significance was attached to reports that foreigners were exchanging futures for cash grain at a rapid rate and that the pit supply of future holdings appeared to have reen greatly lessened. The fact that prices in Argentina were higher despite rains there, assisted in causing the rise.

In the late transactions rather tharp defines from the top quofations of the day were recorded owing to sales to realize profits on purchases made during the callier hours. According to some authorities, sympathy with New York stock market recessions was to a considerable extent responsible for the selling movament here at the finish.

Wet weather had a strengthening effect on the corn market. The gor-trainent crop report was expected to be buillish but the Washington figures given out after the market closed indicated a much smaller yield than the trade generally had estimated. Oats merely reflected the strength of other careals.
