PUBLIC SCHOOLS REOPENED TODAY

Quite a Number of Changes in the Teaching Staff Large Increase in Attendance to be Provided for—Manual Training and Domestic Science Departments This Term

Today marks the opening of the public schools of the city for the fall term and the large majority of the seven thousand pupils who on June 27th, entered upon their summer vacation have resumed their studies.

The number of pupils already referred to has been increased by 80—a record for the first day—that being the number of permits issued to date, and applications are expected for another hundred before the end of the week.

Present indications point to an increase of fully twelve hundred this season, but how they will all be accommodated has not been finally arranged.

A number of changes have been made in the teaching staff. Dr. Bridges says that the manual training and domestic science departments will be opened in the immediate future.

Dr. Bridges said this morning that it was impossible to say at present just how the attendance compared with that of last season and no final count could be made until after Labor Day.

Changes of Teachers Owing to the pressure of pupils in the High school, grade VIII, in charge of Mrs. Randall, has been removed to Victoria school, and S. A. Worrall, formerly principal of the Grammar school at St. Andrews, will take charge of the new grade in the High school.

Manual Training It is probable that the manual training department will be opened tomorrow, as practically everything is in readiness, and all that remains is to draw up a timetable.
