## RAILROAD TRAINMEN.

**Meeting in Moncton  
to Adjust Some  
Differences.**

**A KNOTTY QUESTION**

**Promotion and Other  
Things Involved—Will  
Meet Again—Inter-  
esting Rumor from Shed-  
iac—A Slight Accident.**

Moncton, Nov. 29.—Deputations of I. C. R. men representing the Order of Railway Conductors and Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen met here last evening to discuss the difficulty on the Eastern Division of the I. C. R. between Truro and Pictou. Some months ago there was an agitation among the railway men whose homes were along the Eastern division to have drivers and firemen from points along the main line in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick sent back to their former homes in order that promotion among the natives might be more rapid. That agitation was partially successful. At a meeting of the Drivers and Firemen and others interested, a compromise was effected whereby some of the drivers who had been sent from the main line to Stellarton, New Glasgow, Sydney and other points were sent back home. No sooner was the agitation among the drivers and firemen settled than a similar one was made by the conductors and trainmen of the same division to have the Nova Scotia men from the main line transferred in effort to have been made to have the parties affected settle the matter among themselves, but this has been found impossible. Consequently the question has been referred to the Boards of adjustment representing the O. R. C. and B. Y. R. T. to settle.

The committee which met here last night was composed of the following:—Jas. Millican, St. John; W. J. Dickson, J. J. Daley, Halifax; J. R. Fisher, Truro; Rod. McDonald, Pictou; W. A. Mitchell, Lewis; W. Crockett, Moncton; of the O. R. C., and Arthur Bernier, St. Flavie; J. E. Rioux, Trois Pictou; F. J. De Ham, Halifax; John R. Demar, Stellarton; Arch. McDonald, Sydney; J. A. Bernier, St. Flavie; Andrew Crookshank, A. R. Fisher, Truro; Elias White, and N. H. Morton, Moncton of the B. Y. R. T.

The joint Board at their meeting was unable to reach an understanding and it was decided to adjourn until next Tuesday, to meet again at Moncton. The question, it is feared will involve considerable difficulty, before being finally settled. If the Eastern Division men carry their point many Truro conductors and trainmen will be affected and will be sent back while the Branch men will receive more rapid promotions.

It is reported there that a well known Shediac man has quietly stepped out leaving many wondering friends behind to mourn his departure.

A slight accident occurred on the I. C. R. about two miles out of Moncton on the northern division last night. The engine on Sweeten's special broke down and was sent into Moncton light. The Maritime express was detained here about three hours on account of the accident.

## Morning News in Brief.

### Local.

At a convention of the Conserva-  
tive party held at Amherst yester-  
day afternoon Mayor Jas. W. Day,  
of Parrsboro, was unanimously chosen  
to contest the county in the bye-  
election to be held on Dec. 15 to fill  
the vacancy caused by the elevation  
of the Hon. Thomas R. Black to the  
senate.

Mrs. Anne Cossett, who resided at  
one at Smith's Cove, about six  
miles from Digby, N. S., was found  
dead at her home yesterday after-  
noon about 3 o'clock. On Sunday  
the deceased was in her usual health  
but yesterday afternoon when some  
of the neighbors called at the house  
she was found dead. She was 60  
years of age. An inquest is being  
held.

A Sydney despatch says—"It has  
just been discovered that the ballot  
boxes used at a polling booth at  
Grand Narrows, a district in the  
north riding of Cape Breton, where  
D. J. MacKenzie, Liberal, and John  
MacCormack, Conservative, were  
candidates, was an illegal one. The  
illegality arises in there not being a  
slot in which to deposit the ballots  
as required by law. To overcome the  
difficulty the lid which swung on  
small hinges had to be removed, re-  
turning officer slipping the ballots  
in through the opening."

At Sussex yesterday Miss Gallag-  
her, Campbell settlement, was  
thrown out of her carriage, owing  
to her horse running away. She was  
badly bruised but no bones were  
broken.

A west bound train at an early  
hour yesterday morning ran down a  
flock of sheep at the eastern sema-  
phore, Sussex yard, killing ten of  
them. The sheep belonged to W. H.  
Holman, butcher, of Sussex.

A Moncton despatch says—"A well  
known young Shediac shipping mer-  
chant and alderman is reported as  
mourning his departure. He was  
well known in Shediac, Moncton and  
other parts of the country as a pro-  
ducer and shipper.

Isaac H. Mathers, who, in the  
early seventies, was well known in  
the lumber business in this city, is  
staying at the Royal. For the last  
twenty-three years he has acted as  
Swedish and Norwegian vice-consul  
at Halifax and for his services his  
Majesty King Oscar II made him  
Order of the first class of the Royal  
Order of King Olaf.

It is announced that the Eastern  
Steamship Company is to build two  
new steamers of the Calvia Austin  
plan only they will be turbine steam-  
ers. One will be for the St. John-  
Boston route.

## HE TALKS OF TIMBER.

**C. T. Tyrer, English  
Wood Broker, Has  
Interesting Views.**

C. T. Tyrer, of Smith and Tyrer,  
wood brokers, of Liverpool, Eng-  
land, is making his annual visit to  
Canada and is now at the Royal hotel.  
Talking of English matters, he  
said that spruce was at the lowest  
mark it had reached in England for  
twenty-five years. Latterly, the price  
has rallied five shillings to seven and  
six pence a standard, but a heavy  
rush round sent it down again.

As heavy stocks of wood are on  
hand on both sides of the Atlantic,  
the curtailed cut this year will not  
have much effect till August of next  
year. Canadian spruce is a cheaper  
wood than the continental variety  
but has some qualities which make it  
superior. It has superior toughness  
and larger grain, thus being less  
liable to rot, but making it harder  
to work. The softer wood comes  
from Russia and Bosnia.

Mr. Tyrer spoke of the protection  
movement in England and is strong-  
ly opposed to it. He thinks Canada  
has a great future before her, but  
sounded a warning note to the farm-  
ers. In their spruce forest he believes  
they have a mine of inexhaustible  
wealth if properly treated. He thinks  
no tree under six inches of the butt  
should be allowed by law to be cut.  
A war with Russia would  
raise the prices of timber. Manchuria  
according to Col. Younghusband has  
fine forests and the first pretension  
of Russia rose from a timber concession  
granted by the Chinese to a Russian  
firm.
