N. B. FARMERS' PARLIAMENT

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 22.—This afternoon's session of the United Farmers' convention considered the financial statement. The deficit amounts to \$1,438.14. The total disbursement last year was \$3,981.07.

Election Had Bad Effect. C. Gordon Sharpe, of Woodstock, secretary-treasurer, presented the financial report. Stronger organization was needed. Agriculture was the industry upon which all others depend. Agriculture was successfully passing through the period of depression and was becoming stronger.

The recent general election had had a bad effect on the organization. A stronger spirit of class consciousness was needed. Too many farmers had returned to their former political parties. The majority, however, felt that all should stick together. More money must be provided. Membership fees provided but \$2,464.50 and the system was unsatisfactory.

On the motion of Mr. Sharpe, a resolution condemning any move toward the introduction of a measure for the dealing with the liquor traffic on a revenue basis was passed unanimously.

Rev. W. D. Wilson, of Fredericton, field secretary of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance, and Donald Fraser of Plaster Rock, president of the same body, addressed the convention.

Mr. Wilson drew attention to the fact that in the province of Quebec only 300 municipalities out of 3,000 had adopted revenue producing liquor act.

Mr. Fraser said that the devil was trying to ask the people if they would sell their souls for revenue.

C. N. Vroom, of St. Stephen, said that under Chief Inspector Hawthorne conditions in regard to enforcement of the prohibition act were growing worse all the time. The proposed legislation would destroy all which had been accomplished.

The session this evening was devoted chiefly to hearing addresses on the subject "Women's Place in Farmers' Organization."

Mrs. Mulhern talks. Mrs. J. Mulhern, of Grand Falls, who had addressed a session in the afternoon by taking issue with President Donald Fraser, of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance, because of remarks which he had made about crime conditions in Quebec province, followed.

Mulhern took issue at once with Mr. Riley in his reference to the farmer's wife as the poor woman.

The wife of a laboring man was not dragged into a labor union, why should the farmer's wife be dragged in? Her place was in the home, aiding her husband and organizing there. She did not believe that women should have the franchise. They were needed to clean up politics, without doubt, but the cleaning process should start in the homes.

Old-fashioned mothers were needed, but the world was not ready to accept them. The farmer's wife was the most contented woman on earth. She had the consciousness of work well done and pride in a happy home. She was deprived of comforts as to many imagined. She had pains, vicarious and the best class of literature, far different from the filth story to be found in the city home.

WOULD DEMAND FEES OF THE MAIL ORDER HOUSES. Truro, N. S., Feb. 22.—Legislation requiring mail order houses to take out a municipal license at a substantial fee in any municipality in which they do business is being urged at the fifth annual meeting of the Retail Merchants' Association convention, held at Truro, N. S., today.

A resolution was adopted protesting against manufacturers or wholesalers supplying with goods farmers who conduct sales in retail stores.
