In 1919 Perry "jumped" the Philadelphia team, but Connie Mack induced him to return to the Athletics in 1920.

Boston, June 7.—Allan Sothern, a pitcher recently acquired by the Red Sox from St. Louis, was returned today. According to Red Sox officials full details of Sothern's contract were not made available when waivers were asked on him. Sothern had made two unsuccessful starts in the Red Sox uniform.

Good Bunting.
New York, June 7.—Managers Cobb of Detroit and Speaker of Cleveland set good examples to their players yesterday. The "Tiger" leader showed his men that even Babe Ruth's batting stunt was within his range and batted off his eighth home run of the season. Two of Cobb's players, Daus and Blue, followed suit. Speaker returned to the Indian line-up as a regular and made four hits. The world's champions outbatted Boston, thirteen hits to nine, but lost by seven runs to six.

Leonard Still Champion.
Harrison Park, N. J., June 6.—Benny Leonard defended his title of lightweight champion of the world in a 12-round bout here tonight at the Newark baseball club's park, his opponent being Rocky Kansas of Buffalo.

Under the New Jersey law no decision is allowed to be made by the referee, but in the opinion of the majority of experts around the ringside, Leonard cleverly outpointed his opponent.

A crowd, estimated by the management at 30,000, was present. There were two minor bouts of four and six rounds and then Sam Mosberg, of New York, for national amateur light-weight champion, mixed it for eight rounds with Bert Spencer of Brooklyn. Sporting writers at the ring side picked Mosberg as an easy winner.

Pete Letazo, of Scranton (Pa.), defeated Bud Logan, of San Antonio (Tex.), in another eight-round bout.

Benny Valgar, of New York, outpointed Phil Logan, of Jamestown, New York, in the semi-final bout of eight rounds.

Just before the principals entered the ring it was announced that Leonard weighed 136 and Kansas 134.

ONE MILLION DOLLARS IS VALUE OF HORSES BOUGHT BY MCCOMBER.
A million dollars' worth of blooded race horses bought by A. K. McComber from the stables of the late W. K. Vanderbilt arrived in New York last week on the United States mail liner Old North State from London, in which special stalls had been built for them.

The valuation of \$1,000,000 was given by Captain Theodore Salongre, who had them in charge, and who said some of the forty-five horses would be put up for sale next fall. In the Vanderbilt stables still remain 110 race horses which will be sold.

Among the best known of the new arrivals were: Overlight, winner of the 236,000 franc race last year at Longchamps; Tchad, winner of the French Derby in 1919; Bruner, winner of the Grand Prix in 1920; Maintenance, said to be worth more than all other three-year-old stallions lumped together, and Star, at one time considered the greatest race horse in England.

C. N. R. Driver Dies on Train.

REPORT ON GRAIN IN CANADA IN ELEVATORS.
