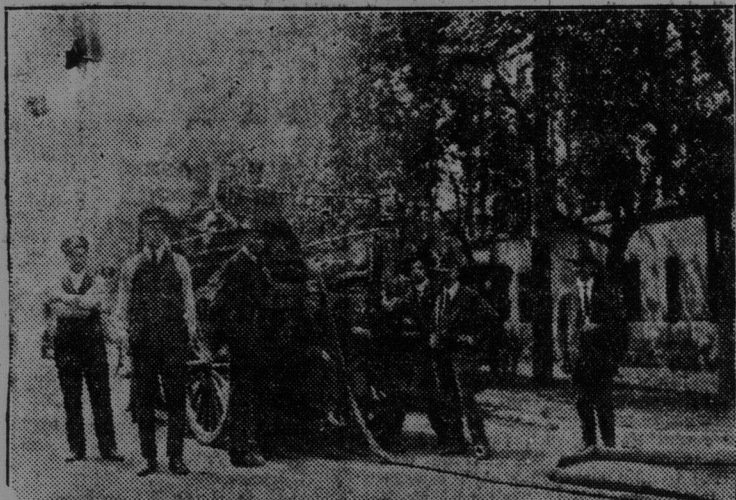

Indicate The Prospect Of  
Three Separate Platforms

Ottawa, June 9.—The lines of cleavage on the fiscal issue may not be decided by formal amendments to the government's budget proposals but the developments of today's opening speeches on the budget debate made it nevertheless clear that the members of the three sides of the house, government, opposition, cross benches will have three separate platforms for the coming electoral year.

The government side as already defined by the finance minister stands pat. The budget was endorsed today by two Liberal Unionist ministers, Hon. Messrs. Sifton and Balfour. The minister of customs in a fifteen minute reply to the opposition fiscal expert, McMaster of Brome, gave a blanket endorsement to the new tariff and taxation proposals; pleaded that for the time being the government was adopting the most expedient course possible and that one could expect any revolutionary tariff proposals this session at least. He said it was a plea to the western Unionists to "stay put" for the present, at least, and to continue to support this war-time government. The minister of marine and fisheries frankly avowed himself as a moderate protectionist and maintained that Liberals and Conservatives alike must continue to support the protectionist tariff.

On the opposition side, Mr. McMaster and Mr. Tupper took the tariff revision downwards stand, urging first relief to the consumers by freeing from tariff restrictions the implements of production and products of the farm. Incidentally, of course, they trenchantly criticized the whole financial policy of the government noting the improvident lavish expenditures of the past few years and the opportunity given to the profiteers and the vested interests to loot the nation through the medium of locking up their profits in tax free loan funds.

Testifies at Trial of Murder That  
Storm Prevented Rescue  
of Hansen

Government Rests Case — Young  
Officer's Statement Says Crew  
Was Unruly and Would Not  
Obey

New York, June 10.—The government rested its case in its prosecution of the case of the barkentine Pooko, who was charged with murder on the high seas, when the defense, Dudley Field Malone, indicated that an effort would be made to prove the crew was unruly and that his clients were brought in Cape Town, South Africa, at their request.

Mr. Malone said that when Axel Hansen jumped overboard, August 6, 1918, he was a sailor that forbade attempt to rescue. It is believed the defense will show that Hansen was melancholy and committed suicide. The ship's cook committed suicide by jumping overboard.

OBJECT TO GIVING EVIDENCE

Ottawa, June 9.—A decided disinclination on the part of retail merchants' associations to give evidence before the committee on living cost which the mayors of various cities have been asked to organize to secure evidence for the parliamentary committee, was revealed at today's sitting of that body.

George E. Nicholson, M. P. for East Algoma, selected as chairman of a special committee of the House of Commons to investigate the cost of living.

The letters from the retailers also declared that they would not give evidence before any committee but a parliamentary committee. E. B. Devlin said in view of the developments the only thing for the committee to do is to summons a number of retail dealers to give evidence. Mr. Stevens remarked that the committee had not asked for anything like a complete investigation by the retail committee but for information as to the prevailing retail prices in the various cities.

George E. Nicholson, chairman of the committee, remarked that the mayors of Winnipeg, Quebec, and Port William had practically "passed the buck" to other bodies. He said that apparently the only way to get at the bottom of things, is by sending for necessary witnesses. At this point, E. B. Devlin moved that Sir Joseph Flavel be requested to appear before the committee. The motion carried.

URGES \$2,000 AS  
MINIMUM SALARY

Hamilton, June 9.—Something of a challenge was hurled at the Presbyterian general assembly, on resuming of business sessions here today. The moderator read the following telegram from W. H. Maroon, an ex-clerical of Alberni (B. C.):

"The assembly stand for the Master's teaching of co-operation and brotherhood, and join the Methodist in denouncing the only remedy, the public ownership of the means of wealth production. The whole world is groaning under the present system and demanding relief. What would be his words to-day? God does not make our laws. We do. The church should lead in this momentous matter. Do you want revolution?"

The moderator suggested that this document be handed to the home mission and social service committee and let the members decide with it.

The matter of representation of women on church boards, was brought up and shelved for another year without comment.

The question was the outcome of a resolution passed by the Presbyterian ministry of the committee to which the business was referred. Dr. MacKinnon put the case of the undersold ministers eloquently before the assembly citing the hard lot of a large proportion of the ministers and their families who were actually poverty-stricken and in consequence discouraged and dropping out.

The committee recommended that the minimum stipend of ordained married men be increased to \$1,500 and a manse or rented house, that the stipend of unmarried ministers be \$1,400. Corresponding increases were recommended for the various classes of ministers, the stipends of the married men in each case to be \$100 more than the unmarried.

Dr. MacKinnon declared that so appalling was the poverty of many occupants of the manse that unless something was speedily done to remedy this deplorable condition that recruits would be hard to get and the whole work of the church would be imperilled.

He spoke in support of the recommendations, declaring that the minimum stipend should be \$2,000. The proposal was disapproved. He thought it only required the calling of the attention of congregations in the proper way to ministers who were badly paid and the matter would be remedied.

E. A. Thompson, of Lynden, of the synod of Hamilton and London, from whence the overture came, also spoke in strong support.
