QUART OF BEER TO SUPREME COURT

Kansas Judges to Decide as To It Being Intoxicating

SOME PROHIBITION POSERS

Witnesses Asked to Tell By Odor of Breath What Brand of Whiskey Has Been Drunk by De-

lawsuit is a cynicism often applied to whether the man who sold the best should be sent to jail for thirty days.

Rollin Thrush, of Topeka, went to T. C. Robert's home, bought a quart bottle of beer and drank it. The police arrested Roberts. Thrush testified that he knew the stuff he drank was beer, but it had no more effect upon him than a similar quantity of sweet milk. He also testified that he had not tasted beer for some weeks and seldom drank. What Are Effects of Beer? The three lawyers for Robert have

taken to the supreme court the convic-tion of their client. They argue that one quart of beer would certainly produce some exhiliarating effect upon any man not accustomed to drinking liquor, and that therefore, this beer which man not accustomed to unaming agos, and that therefore, this beer which Thrush purchased was not intoxicating, and Robert should not be sent to jail.

The three lawyers for Robert and the attorney general and county attorned will argue the case in the supreme court next Thursday. The state will try to prove that beer is intoxicating.

There is always a hot fight along the Kansas-Oklahoma border over hauling liquor from one state to the other. One man had some motor car inner tubes made specially to his order and he shipped these to a distiller, who filled the tubes with whiskey, inserted them into a regular tire on a demountable rim and shipped the outfit to his customer. Now A. G. Bowman is fighting in the courts to prove that the liquor came to him in "original packages," and cannot be confiscated and he cannot be punished for receiving it. receiving it.

Some of the witnesses swore the two men were drunk, as the witnesses had smelled whicker on their the brand, the court dismissed the case, holding that a man claimed to be competent to tell whether a man was drunk or not should be able to detect the brand of whiskey from the breath.

But Kansans have one way of getting drunk, when they are determined to do so, without fear of the courts or anyone else. All that is necessary is to buy a jug of apple cider, put a few spoonfuls of sugar into it and drive around a few hours with the sugar and cider mixing and it does not take long to start fermentation and produce an alcoholic beverage.

Cider Makers Win Victories. The Kansas courts have been trying to stop the practice of some cider manufacturers putting sugar into the cider and shipping it into Kansas, but thus far they have failed, as in the half-dozen trials held in the state the cider makers were able to prove that the cider was pure and non-alcoholic when it left was pure and non-alcoholic when it left their factories.


