**POLITICS, WAR AND THANKSGIVING IN THE CITY CHURCHES**

In speaking on the subject, The War We See It, Rev. Dr. Hutchinson in the Main street Baptist church last evening said his advice to Premier Borden this time would be "Pay no attention to the party men in the cabinet. Just now, we as Canadians do not want political contests. We are united in fighting a common foe, and we want to remain united." This sentiment was so warmly endorsed by the congregation that they applauded the preacher vigorously.

Harvest thanksgiving services were celebrated in the Anglican churches of the city. The services were well attended and in many cases the offering for the Red Cross or Belgian Relief Funds. The churches were beautifully decorated with the fruits of the soil and with flowers.

Special thanksgiving services were also held in Centenary church. Rev. W. H. Barraclough, preached in the morning and Rev. George M. Young of Trenton, F. I., in the evening.

Rev. J. A. Morrison, D. D., preached an interesting sermon to his congregation in the Carleton Presbyterian church last evening when he gave a history of the founding of the Red Cross society which is now endorsed by forty-three nations in time of war. He commended the work to all and quoted addresses of Lady Tilly and Mrs. F. S. White who are taking an active part in the Red Cross Society in St. Andrew's church.

The cadets of St. Stephen's and St. Andrew's churches, under command of Major W. C. Magee, paraded to St. Andrew's church yesterday morning when a stirring sermon was preached to them by the pastor, Rev. J. H. MacVicar, D. D., from the text "Quit you like men, be strong." Among the officers were Captain Mansford Brown and Sergeant Vail of St. Stephen's and Captain Marvin White and Lieutenants F. Welford and C. Ferguson of St. Andrew's. The pipe band was in attendance.

**SPORTSMEN'S BATTALION A FEATURE OF NEW BRITISH ARMY**

London, Oct. 12.—Recruiting for the famous sportsmen's battalion proceeds apace, the enrollment totalling about 1,000. It is in many ways a unique corps. It is raised and financed by Mrs. Cunliffe Owen and is, in all probability, the only battalion of any of the great modern armies to be brought into being by a woman. It is certainly the only battalion in the British forces in which the age limit has been especially extended by the authorities. The recruiting posters read: "The Sportsmen's Battalion is a corps for gentlemen up to 40 years of age."  
 In the chief recruiting headquarters at the Hotel Cecil a press agent occupies a prominent corner. Payment by a recruit for his equipment is optional. The training and equipment are what are required by an ordinary infantry company. Among the distinguished men already enrolled as privates are: Sir Norman Pringle, Bart., Sir William Wallace, Sir Robert Newman, Bart., and two sons of peers who have not yet passed the medical examination. The percentage of rejections among the applicants is a low record for recruiting in the campaign. Up to date it is less than five per cent. The training ground of the corps will be at "The Greys," Hornchurch, Romford.
