Toys Play Important Part in Diplomacy of Old World

Princess Juliana of Holland—King Peet of Few Months Only

Princess Juliana of Holland, next heir to the throne of the Netherlands, and aged about two, is reported in the cable dispatches of last week to have displayed contemptuous indifference not to say scorn for the three sunsh dolls, dressed to the very height of Parisian fashion, one of them in hobble, and another in harem style, contained in the interior of the large and beautiful mechanical wax presented to her by President Fallieres, on the occasion of his recent visit to her mother, Queen Wilhelmina, in Amsterdam, and at the Hague. Indeed, the young Princess is stated to have contemptuously rejected the dolls contemptuously aside, and to have manifested her very pronounced preference for her old-fashioned doll in Dutch costume.

Whether or not this is likely to affect the future relations of France and the Netherlands, remains to be seen. For, holding her little daughter as she does, Queen Wilhelmina is naturally disposed to feel kindly towards those who give the child pleasure, and equally strongly prejudiced against those who for one reason or another fail to succeed in this particular respect. Toys play, in fact, a very notable role in the relations of the world, when the heirs apparent of so many Old World thrones are in childhood or infancy. If the royal parents' heart can be won by pleasure given to their little one, half the cause is won; whereas if the child is disappointed in the presents, its parents are liable to conceive a feeling of resentment against the donor.

Much of the hesitation of the Russian government to join hands with France in that alliance, which still exists, was dispelled by the particularly beautiful and costly presents brought, first of all by President Loubet, then by President Loubet, and lastly by President Fallieres, to the children of the Czar. In fact, in 1908 President Fallieres completely won the heart of the little Czarovitch by presenting him, on the occasion of his visit to Reval, with a railroad train valued at \$2,000,000, which was impudently dubbed by the press as the "train-man."

President Loubet, when he went to Rome, took with him no less than five big packing cases of toys, for the young princesses, Yolande and Mafalda, and the children of the Czar, which though in the nature of a doll's house, had nevertheless chairs and benches of sufficient size to seat, at the same time, small princesses. The epoches of the dining room were filled with the necessary table linen, all beautifully embroidered with the monogram and crown of Princess Yolande. The table-cloth and dishes, also the china, were decorated in the same way. The dining room and kitchen were furnished with the necessary furniture, and as the presiding genius there, she carried with her a large doll as big as Princess Yolande herself, in the form of a sufficient size to seat, with jewelry and gold ornaments complete. This doll was seated on a toy throne, as if going to the market, and the market baskets on either side of the toy steed were filled with more toys of every conceivable character, from the smallest toy soldier, cleaning, soap and bathing powder, the curative "Pain-killers," small Zeppelin dirigibles, and the most modern toys, such as airplanes, balloons, rickshaws, and all for treating bites, insect bites and wounds. The Evening Chit-Chat

SEVERAL weeks ago I asked my reader friends to join with me in a discussion on class distinction. Almost everyone admits there is such a fact as class. But not every one is satisfied with the vulgar notion that the possession of money is the proper class criterion.

Therefore, I thought it would be interesting to find out what thinking people do make their class criterion, what qualities they consider place a man or woman in the "upper class."

Letters have come to me on this subject. I regret that I can only print a few.

You ask your readers to give their opinions on class distinction. Why not attribute class distinction to nature? The good authority which says all people are born free and equal is true as far as birth goes, but nature soon shows they are far from being equal and while children are more truly democratic than their elders, class distinction is soon in evidence in all our schools without regard to wealth or poverty. So it is evident that nature is the true author of class distinction and the "upper class" is the class we all look up to whether wealthy or otherwise. Am I not right?

"To my way of thinking the upper class consists of those who possess that innate refinement which cannot be fully acquired by the most diligent study. It is a refinement which, by a very nature, makes itself felt at all times. The individual who acts the perfect gentleman or lady under all circumstances and to all fellow creatures, no matter what their station in life, belongs to this class. Success or wealth count for nothing unless accompanied by refinement and culture; but the latter could be overlooked if the former were there. However, this refinement the essence to this class is hidden."

"In my country (Germany) are many classes, all fully recognized. Without I believe there is only one class that is recognized as the best all over the world, as it brings forth our best and greatest thinkers and creators, our most intelligent and diligent men and women. We call it the 'educated,' or better, the 'refined (cultured)' middle class. The people of this class are never too rich, often very poor, and yet they will always be recognized by the 'highest' class as well as the lowest, as THE CLASS."

"In regard to who are the upper class, I would say that the upper class are those who are able to rise in the face of all obstacles from obscurity to fame by their own force of character. Someone has written that upon them, as said that 'some people are born great, some become great on their own account.' Then, I would say, according to this philosophy, that it is only those who are able to make themselves great, provided they become honestly, who are entitled to classify themselves as belonging to the upper class. There have ever been class differences, upper, middle and lower, both in birth, fortune and intellect, and that difference will continue while human nature lasts, in spite of the influence of independence to the contrary notwithstanding."
