THE WEATHER.

Toronto, July 30, 8 p.m.—Thunderstorms have occurred over Lake Superior, but elsewhere in Canada the weather has been very fine. A period of fine weather is indicated for the Territories and Manitoba as well as for nearly all other localities.

Probabilities:—Lower lakes and Georgian Bay—Light to moderate variable winds; generally fine and decidedly warm, but a few scattered showers are threatened locally.

Local temperatures:—Highest, 35 above; lowest, 55 above.

RAIN WATER REIGNS.

THE PLUVIOUS PERIOD AN AFTER TASTE OF THE DELUGE.

A reader of an inquiring turn of mind, has made some calculations based on the enormous rainfall of the present month. He says:—A gallon of water weighs 10 pounds, and if spread out in a layer one inch thick, will only cover an area of two square feet. "An inch of rain gives 22,662 gallons for 100 tons of water per acre, or 60,000 tons per square mile. A farmer who has a 100 acre farm will receive on his farm 10,000 tons of water for each inch of rain. A month that the rainfall of the present month is unprecedented, being already 8 1/2 inches, so the farmer mentioned above will have to his credit 133,333 tons, or 30,216,000 gallons. Eight inches of rainfall upon a square mile means 123,250,000 gallons or 616,000 tons. It would be interesting to know whether the phenomenal rainfall of this season has any connection with the prohibition agitation. Whether the referendum is carried or not, the country will get its full share of cold water anyway.

THAMESFORD MAN HURT.

CHRISTOPHER BROCK'S HORSE FRIGHTENED BY ELECTRIC CAR.

Christopher Brock of the village of Thamesford met with a serious accident while proceeding to his home from Woodstock with a load of furniture on Tuesday afternoon. He had reached a point a few hundred yards east of Fairmount Park, and seeing the 430 o'clock car coming east, he got out of the wagon for the purpose of holding the horse, which was a nervous animal, by the head. As the car, carried by him the horse and driven by Mr. Brock to the ground, the animal's feet coming down squarely on his body. After tramping on him considerably the horse made a freight dash across the railway track and collided with the barbed wire fence, cutting itself severely.

Meanwhile the car and stopped, and the male members of the Burrill Stock Company who were on board, hastened to the scene of the accident. They found Mr. Brock semi-conscious and suffering from a cut on the side of the head and a badly injured back. He was carried onto the car and conveyed to Dr. Wel-ford's office, where his wounds were dressed. The physician found him to be very seriously injured internally, the horse's feet having bruised the organs of the abdomen.

Subsequently the injured man was removed to the Woodstock General Hospital, and although he is yet in a critical condition, the progress he is making is satisfactory. His wife was communicated with and she arrived at his bedside Wednesday morning.

LACROSSE

The Toronto News says: "The Woodstock lacrosse club is the first of the Canadian Lacrosse Association clubs to raise the point as to the eligibility of the players of the defunct Paris Club to play with other C.L.A. clubs. The Woodstock club has made application to the Judiciary Committee through Secretary Hall for permission to play three Paris players. The trio are:—Layden, Shaugnessy and another. The question will be threshed out at the meeting on Friday night."

The S.-R. says: "The 'another' referred to is Wickson, the crack point player of the Paris team and there is the strongest possibility that all three will be landed here."

Brantford, July 30.—Brantford's fast team of lacrosse players, acknowledged to be the coming champions of the C. L. A., took an exhibition game from the London seniors this afternoon. While the score was 11 goals to 1, the game was a well contested one throughout and an excellent workout for both teams. Both teams played good lacrosse, and it is distinctly to London's credit that they succeeded in holding down the local players so well. It is something that the much-lauded Tecumseh were unable to do. During the progress of the game, the French received a dirty check from Taylor (Brantford), for which the latter was roundly hissed from the grandstand.

DUNDAS ST. METHODIST CHURCH, WOODSTOCK.

On Monday evening next, a special service will be held in the above church when the new organ will be opened by Mr. G. Fryatt-Mountford, L. Mus., L.C.M., organist of "King Street Methodist church, Ingersoll. We hope there will be a good attendance as a very fine programme, as follows, will be given:

- 1.—Bell Rondo in F, G. Morandi. This pleasing composition by this celebrated Italian organist, is written in "Binary Form," and its style is like an overture.
- 2.—Pastorate in A, Alex. Guilman (of Paris). This is the first movement from this well known French master's first organ Sonata. It is very well written and is truly original.
- 3.—Wedding March in C, G. Fryatt-Mountford. This work was specially composed for a military wedding at Glamis, Cork, Ireland, in 1901. It contains a short trio in F, and ends with varied harmonies on its leading theme.
- 4.—Vocal Solo, The Bedouin Love Song—Halley—Mr. Albert Greenlaw (of the Fisk Jubilee Singers).
- 5.—Swiss Organ Sonata, Felix Mendelssohn. This masterpiece opens with a chorale which is treated in varied form, and in the third section the theme is on the pedals with arpeggio chords on the manuals, a short frigate in D minor follows, concluding with an andante in D major. This fine work was composed at Düsseldorf in 1845.
- 6.—Vocal Selection—The choir of 7.—Overture to The Occasional Oratorio—Dundas street Methodist church.
- 8.—G. F. Handel (b. 1685, d. 1759): (a) Adagio, (b) Allegro, (c) Adagio, (d) March. This fine work was composed at London in 1746 and displays this great German Master's characteristic style.

INTERVAL—PART II.

- 1.—Triumphal March—J. Lemmens. This clever French organist wrote an "Organ School" and his compositions are all remarkable for their originality of thought and earnestness of purpose.
 - 2.—Improvisation on a theme given by the audience.
 - 3.—Song—Old Black Joe—Mr. Albert Greenlaw.
 - 4.—Arrante in A—Henry Smart (b. and d. London, Eng., 1813-1879). This charming organ piece by the famous English organist and church composer is very original. The composer was granted a pension by Mr. Gladstone's government for his services to art. He became blind in early life and died in 1879.
 - 5.—Finale—God Save the King. With variations. Ch. H. Ruck.
