Religious Training.—Moral culture must not be ignored in the sublime work of education. Not only must the intellect be trained to think and judge correctly, but also the will and heart must be formed to act according to the dictates of reason and revelation. A man is bound by natural and voluntary obligations towards his Creator, himself, and his fellow-men. He must know these obligations in order to fulfil them. Hence the necessity of studying fundamental principles of religion for the harmonious development and perfection of man, who is rational, free and responsible for his acts.

REMARKS.

1. Books, stationery, and medicine form extra charges. Payment must be made semi-annually in advance. Students entering after the beginning of the term are charged only for the remaining portion. Every month begun must be paid for in full. Students leaving the College during the month of May are charged for the remainder of the term.

2. For the better maintenance of order and discipline, young men coming from other Colleges are received only on the best recommendations.

3. The students wear no special uniform ; but each is supposed to have a dark suit for Sundays and feast days, an overcoat, under-clothing, hosiery, toilet requisites, and table napkins.

4. All mail matter, sent by the students, or delivered to them, is subject to the inspection of the President or his delegate.

5. Parents and guardians will receive a semi-annual Bulletin of the health, application, progress, etc., of their children or wards.
