


**BOSTON & MAINE INCREASE SALARIES** 

BOSTON, Feb. 24-It was announced today by the officials of the Boston and Maine Railroad that an agreement had been reached whereby the wages of all passenger, freight and yard con-ductors and brakemen will soon by raised. The schedules for the new wage scale are very long and will not be made known for several days. The agreement for the increase was reached after a conference Saturday between a delegation of the employees and General Manager Frank Barr and today Vice President Lee made public the result of the conference. The increase will affect more than 2,300 employes, including 1,000 conduc-tors and 1,800 brakemen and will, it is said, entail an additional annual expenditure of \$125,000 by the com-pany.
