### THE NORMAL SCHOOL CLOSING EXERCISES

Fredericton, June 5.—The formal closing exercises at the Provincial Normal School to mark the close of the academy year at that institution were marked by the usual interesting events, which always prove so attractive to the relatives and friends of the young ladies who pass out year after year from the institution to take their places in keeping the educational system of New Brunswick up to its high standard. Principal Bridges presided and while the early morning weather was not auspicious, there was an unusually large attendance of visitors. On the platform with Dr. Bridges were Chancellor Jones and Dr. Cox, of the University; Very Rev. Dean Schofield, Rev. Dr. J. H. McDonald, Rev. F. L. Carney, Rev. Miles Howland, Secretary Sampson and J. W. Spurdon, of the school trustees, members of the Normal School faculty and a number of others. After the opening exercises the principal address was given by Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, who congratulated the students upon their work during the year, wished them success in their examinations next week, and gave them some good advice for the future, when they are to enter upon the work of their professions. The following programme was then given: Teaching lesson in History, Miss Grace Young; reading, Miss Ruth Green; song, "An Angel from School," teaching lesson, Miss Irene Dickson; reading, Mr. George Perry, from Culloden to Quebec; the Pipers' Chorus, by school; reading by Miss Stewart; physical drill under direction of Mr. A. S. McFarlane; chorus by young ladies of Class A; reading lesson by Miss Eliza Millie. After the presentation of medals and prizes by Dr. Carter and Dr. Cox, Dr. Jones, Chancellor of the University, delivered an address to the graduates. The proceedings closed with the school singing in chorus, "O Canada," and the National Anthem. The entire programme was well carried out and proved pleasing to the visitors as well as satisfactory to Principal Bridges and staff. The musical work was in charge of Prof. Caldwell and the veteran instructor, who presided at the piano, and whose work has always been productive of such excellent results. The closing examinations for teachers' licenses will commence on Tuesday next and will continue until Friday afternoon. It is expected that the number of those taking the examinations will be unusually large.

### MISSIONARY SOCIETY ELECTS OFFICERS

Mrs. J. D. Chipman, President of W. M. S. for Year—Closing Sessions Held Yesterday—Weather Excellent.

Woodstock, June 6.—During the week, the weather has been fine and exceptionally warm. The closing sessions of the W. M. S. were characterized by the same interest as manifested from the beginning of the convention.

The morning of Thursday was occupied with the election of officers for the ensuing year, and presentation of memorials and resolutions. The election of officers resulted as follows: Hon. Sanford; Treasurer—Mrs. F. Williams; Secretary Mission Bands—Mrs. Enman; Supt. Christian Stewardship—Mrs. Turner.

The delegate elected from this branch to the board of management is Mrs. E. C. Hickson, of St. John with Mrs. H. E. Thomas and Mrs. Lucas alternates. The board meets in Toronto to Sept. 24th, in the Central church. Miss H. E. Stewart was elected to represent this branch at the annual Methodist conference to be held in Fredericton, during the coming week. At the closing session, in the afternoon, Mrs. Ross, of Toronto, addressed the convention, her subject being "Students of Our Work in Frank, B. C." and among the Austrians, Mrs. Ross personally visited these mission stations last year, so her address was listened to with marked attention and interest, as she described the missionary work that is being carried on among these foreign races in our Canadian west.

Greetings were received from the Nova Scotia branch to which a suitable reply was sent. A hearty vote of thanks was passed by the convention to the quarterly board of the church, to the choir and organist, to the C. P. R. and I. C. R. and P. E. I. railway authorities for the courtesy extended, to the press, and especially to the friends in Woodstock, who have so hospitably entertained the convention by opening their homes to the many delegates in attendance, and to the pastor of the church.

### OPPOSITION WILL NOT HAVE TICKET

Northumberland Liberals Satisfied with Fleming Government—No wish to Return to Old, Corrupt Era.

Newcastle, June 7.—With nomination day almost at hand, the opposition forces in Northumberland are having much to contend with in their efforts to make some pretence at opposing the government candidates in the county. So far they have failed to be convinced by their leader, Mr. Copp, that it will be of any material advantage for them to offer themselves as bearers of the opposition standard in Northumberland. They realize that the people of the county are cognizant of the fact that the past four years have been fraught with useful achievement by Premier Fleming and his government, and that it will prove a difficult task to try to prove to the people that there is anything to be gained either by his county or by the province in giving Mr. Copp's colleagues another chance to try their hand at directing the affairs of the province.

So far Mr. Copp has been unable to scare up anyone around here sufficiently foolhardy as to risk time and labor in espousing a hopeless cause, doubly hopeless as far as Northumberland is concerned. Despite his hurried trips through the county, there is no sign as yet of any possible ticket to oppose Messrs. Morrissey, Betts, MacLachlan and Allan, and from all parts of the county it is understood that his efforts to frame a ticket have been so far unavailing. There is every reason to predict that nomination day will find the government candidates unopposed. Hon. Mr. Pugsley paid a hurried visit to Newcastle on Wednesday but the object of his mission has not been made known.

The government candidates are meeting with round receptions in different parts of the county, and the sentiment of the people seems to be entirely favorable to the return of the present administration. The people of Northumberland realize that the past four years have been marked by progress in the county, and that there is no chance of making a change. One of the greatest difficulties which supporters of the opposition party have to contend with is the fact that they have nothing to offer the people in return for their votes, and the electors of Northumberland are not desirous of making a change in favor of Mr. Copp et al.

Another of the things counting against the opposition is that the present administration have kept their pledges to the lumbermen, and as this industry is certain to receive a great benefit from the government, the lumbermen are returned to power, most of the lumbermen have promised their support to the candidates for Premier on election day.

The meetings which have been held by the government candidates have been largely attended. On Thursday evening an enthusiastic audience heard advice by Hon. John Morley and John Betts, at Renous Bridge.

Both the speakers were well received and in their discussion of the campaign, they had a sympathetic audience.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey disposed effectively the criticisms aimed at him in the matter of carrying out the work of the department over which he has control. The manner in which he received a warm reception well for Renous Bridge making it a straight ticket. People from all over the county bring in decidedly encouraging reports of the success of the government candidates. Messrs. Allan and MacLachlan in their tour of the northern section of the county, have had excellent meetings.

The opposition forces are, to all intents and purposes, going to let the government candidates go unopposed. There is talk of one or two "last hope" being pressed into emergency service to make some kind of a show, but even the staunchest opposition men in Newcastle cannot say upon whom their choice will fall. There is but little real organization among the party in Northumberland, and so far they have been groping in the dark, and cannot as yet, see very bright prospects.
