INSURANCE VICTIMS MAKE COMPLAINTS

Persons who purchased bogus insurance policies from the late George E. Williams, of Boston, Mass., whose death revealed an indebtedness of more than \$1,000,000 and that he had been leading a double life, have complained to the Insurance Commissioners, and the Connecticut Mutual Insurance Company, of which he was the agent, may be forced to honor the policies, amounting to \$500,000. Williams' system, while posing as an agent of the Connecticut company, was to make out bogus policies and keep the premiums.

The authorities still are searching for Miss Emma R. Wellington, Mr. Williams' confidential secretary for sixteen years, who was bequeathed \$25,000 in his will.

PILOTS COMPLAIN.

SCHOONER IN TROUBLE.

Vineyard Haven, Mass., Sept. 19.—The schooner Pochasset, Hudson River fleet, when entering Vineyard Sound 14th, during fresh SW her mainboom pennant parted at mainboom, saving crew and the breaking steering wheel and in it so that Capt. Carroll was unable to anchor near Cuttybank Island. Life saving crew took captain and ashore for the night. Next morning they boarded her again and brought her here, where necessary repairs were made. This morning when in the harbor the Pochasset ran on the west side of the harbor, she remained about an hour floating.
