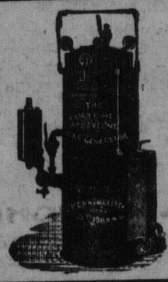

Chicago, Nov. 16.—Five hundred members of the National Association of Tanners, in annual convention here today, said there would be no advance

in the price of shoe leather, unless the nations at war make too big a demand on the surplus stock now in the hands of tanners and shoe manufacturers. Hides and skins, however, were declared to be scarce.

MAY USE ST. JOHN AS REMOUNT STATION

Communication Before Council Yesterday Indicates Horses May be Quartered Here.

It is just possible that the city may have a number of horses for the French government quartered here this winter if the necessary accommodation can be provided. A tender for cost iron pipe for the Lancaster extension was accepted and Commissioner Wigmore's recommendation that the 6-inch main on Germain street be renewed was adopted and there was some discussion on the matter of public meetings to discuss the assessment law at the committee meeting of the council held yesterday. All the members of the council were present.

A telegram from George E. Stacey, French remount station, Ottawa, which was presented to the committee, read as follows: "French government inspectors are going to Prince Edward Island this month to inspect horses for French army. Please advise me if St. John will co-operate in supplying comfortable stable accommodation for, say, 500 horses, which would be stored there until shipped, and involve expenditure of considerable money for feed and attendance. If suitable horses can be secured in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, inspections will be held in these provinces during winter."

The Mayor was authorized to reply that sufficient accommodation could be provided in the exhibition cattle sheds, provided this was agreeable to the Exhibition Association and the military authorities, who are in control of the accommodations at the exhibition grounds.

Weldon & McLean, solicitors for William Ellworth, presented a claim for damages received on April 12, 1916, on the city wharf, West Side, by the planking of the wharf, given way, referred to the Commissioner of Harbors and the city solicitor.

The Mayor drew attention to a letter which appeared in one of the city papers complaining of fire risks arising from public and private garages in wooden buildings. The Commissioner of Public Safety explained the precautions which are being enforced by the fire department.

Commissioner Wigmore asked regarding the status of George Stiles and was informed by the Commissioner of Public Works that he still is on the city pay roll.

Commissioner Wigmore reported that the six-inch main on Germain street, which burst on Wednesday, was in very bad shape and asked for authority to renew it with an eight or ten-inch main from King to Union. This main was laid seventy-two years ago and was practically worn out. He was given the necessary authority.

Commissioner McLean asked about the allotment of benches and was told by Commissioner Russell that they would be allotted to specific lines this year as the steamship companies seem to prefer that arrangement.

On motion of Commissioner Wigmore the tender of the Canada Iron Foundries for 5,000 feet of 24 and 8-inch cast iron pipe for the Lancaster extension, \$48,750, St. John, was accepted, the total cost to be about \$14,000.

Commissioner McLean referred to the meeting held on Wednesday night to discuss the new assessment act, and suggested that better advertising would result in more people attending. He urged the holding of another meeting at an early date. The matter was left in the hands of the Mayor.

The monthly meeting of the board of directors was held last night at the Y. M. C. A. Reports of a most satisfactory nature were submitted from all departments and the directors expressed themselves as well satisfied. Practically every department is showing an increase, particularly the boys' work department where the increase both in attendance and interest in the work is most marked.

MEMBERS OF ONTARIO GOVERNMENT IN CITY

Hon. G. H. Ferguson and Hon. T. W. McGarry Here Yesterday on a Holiday Trip.

Two of the members of the Ontario government visited St. John yesterday. They arrived early in the morning and spent the day in motoring around the city and suburbs, visiting West St. John and looking over the terminal facilities, and Courtenay Bay where they inspected the work being carried on there.

The visitors were Hon. G. H. Ferguson, minister of mines, lands and forests, and Hon. T. W. McGarry, provincial treasurer. They were accompanied by their wives and a sister of Mrs. Ferguson. This is the first time that any of the party have ever visited this part of the Dominion and they expressed themselves as delighted with what they had seen.

Mr. Ferguson said that they were just on a holiday trip; they had heard so much about the Maritime Provinces that they had decided to come down and see for themselves whether the many nice things which they had heard about this part of the country were true or not.

They had come and after visiting the three provinces they were constrained to admit that in the words of the song "the bait had not been told." "We were simply amazed at the wealth of natural resources and the scenic beauty of these provinces by the sea, and the magnificent possibilities of development along agricultural lines."

Mr. McGarry expressed himself almost speechless and the ladies went into raptures over the beauty of the city and its surrounding country. The visitors went back to their homes with a new vision and a better understanding of the part which the port of St. John has played and will play in the development of the Dominion. They left last night for Fredericton and thence home.

BIG SALE OF PULP WOOD IN DALHOUSIE

Enormous Quantity Purchased by International Paper Co. — Heavy Business for Railroads.

The Dalhousie Lumber Co. has disposed of all its pulp wood to the International Paper Co. of Maine. All this pulp wood will be shipped by rail. Over 400 cars will be required to move the lot. Mr. W. A. Nelson, travelling representative for the Bangor and Aroostook Railway arranged with the Dalhousie Lumber Co. to place at the disposal of the company some 200 flat cars to handle this business for his road.

The pulp wood will be loaded on the cars at Dalhousie, taken to Campbellton, and then to St. Leonard on the I. N. R., where the B. and A. Railway will take charge of it. The work of moving this huge shipment has already been started, and there have been several special trains run over the I. N. R. to handle it.

Teachers Training.

The first session of the teacher training class for work in the Sunday schools along the lines of the C. S. E. T. programme was held last night at the Y. M. C. A. Supper was served at 6.15 by the Ladies' Auxiliary and over 50 sat down. The standard taken up last night was the intellectual and was dealt with in three periods. The first was taken by Rev. P. R.
