SPLENDID RESPONSE TO NATIONAL SERVICE CALL

Citizens of Loyalist City Sign and Return 84 Per Cent of the Cards Evincing Their Determination to Do Everything in Their Power to Beat Him.

The citizens of the Loyalist city of St. John have made a splendid response to the appeal of the National Service Commission, and of the cards sent out through the letter carriers eighty-four per cent were signed and returned. This is a most creditable showing and speaks volumes for the determination of the St. John people to do their bit for the Empire in her hour of need.

Major Tilley, director of National Service for New Brunswick, yesterday expressed to a Standard representative, his gratification at this magnificent answer to the call sent forth by the government for a registration of the man-power of the Dominion, and said it showed plainly that the spirit of their Loyalist forefathers still lived in the breasts of their descendants. PROMINENT FORMER N. B. MAN DEAD

Dr. Thomas W. Musgrove, Native of Wickham, Passes Away Far From Old Home

 Aponauk, Febr 2.—L. C. Musgrove, of Lower Millstream, has received news of the death of his brother, Dr. Thos. W. Musgrove, who passed away after a brief illness, on January 3, at his home in Sultan, Snohomish Co., Washington.

Dr. Musgrove was born at Wickham, Queens county, N. B., and was in his 76th year.

In early manhood he was a school teacher and taught in various places throughout the province, and later studied medicine, being a graduate of Harvard Medical School and the University of Michigan. A cultured man in the broadest sense, he was versatile, being equally at home in the realm of medicine and literature, and besides pamphlets on medical subjects and articles in medical journals he was a contributor to the Pathfinder Magazine, and wrote poetry which attracted much attention.

He practised his profession for ten years in Carleton, St. John, between the years 1879 and 1889. Soon after he removed to the American west, and has been resident of Washington since territorial days, except for a short time spent in California immediately before locating in Sultan.

Other places in Washington which were proud to claim him as a resident were Fairhaven, Puyallup, Tacoma and Cashmere.

Dr. Musgrove was thrice married, his first wife being Miss Redstone, of Queens county. By this union three daughters were born to them, of whom Mrs. W. H. Short, of Sunny Bend, Alta., and Mrs. J. B. McNaughton, of Winnipeg, survives, the third, Mrs. Colfax Bart, having passed away sixteen years ago.

His second wife was Miss Taylor, sister of J. Wallace Taylor, of Salisbury, she being the mother of Miss Nellie Musgrove, who resides with her aunt and uncle, L. C. and Miss Henrietta Musgrove, of Lower Millstream.

His third wife survives, also his three daughters: Mrs. C. C. Todd, of Pullman, and the Misses Isabel and Helen Musgrove, of Hoquiam.

Three sisters and three brothers are also left to mourn. The sisters are: Mrs. C. W. Thorne, St. John; Mrs. Wm. Killam, Mt. Middleton, and Miss Henrietta Musgrove, Lower Millstream. The brothers are: Rev. G. N. Musgrove, of California; A. C. Musgrove, Vancouver, and L. C. Musgrove, Lower Millstream.

A very flattering eulogy appeared in the local papers of the town in which the doctor made his home, which read in part:
