their being deaf, and on account of their being isolated.

Q--To what extent do you think education affects their moral qualities?

A--I believe the more education they receive the more refined they become.

Q--There is a lack of refinement resulting entirely from their want of education.

Q--Do you think a deaf mute appreciates the finer qualities of morality in the same way as the hearing people do?

A--Yes, they seem of rather a lower grade than speaking people.

Q--Do you think that it is by reason of their inability to perceive in that respect to the same extent speaking people do?

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J. Henry Brown's Connection With Inquiry.

It was indicated by Mr. Woodbridge that J. H. Brown, of St. John, was very active in bringing together a number of these deaf children, and in that way, in the preparation of the evidence afterwards given.

Q--You have been associated with deaf mutes for the greater portion of your life, have you not?

A--As long as I can remember.

Q--You converse in the sign language and alphabet, quite as readily as they do themselves, do you?

A--Yes, have you by reason of your long acquaintance with them, formed any opinion as to their truth and reliability?

A--I don't think they are at all to be relied on. I don't think they are truthful.

Q--Has that opinion been recently formed, or have you (long) entertained that?

A--That has been my experience.

Q--Have you had trouble with them in that respect?

A--Yes, a great deal.

Q--Can you call any instance to mind that you would go and look to see if everything was done, and it would not be done at all?

Q--That was an untruth that they knew you would find out?

A--I don't know very readily, yes.

Q--Were they artful at all in their untruths as a rule, or would they tell a falsehood like that just as readily, when you could discover the falsity of their statement?

A--Yes, several times.

Q--Has that been pretty much always your estimate with regard to D?

Q--She has practically grown up in the institution since she was a little girl?

Q--Would you accept the statement of one of those girls in a serious matter, when you knew nothing whatever about it yourself, without question?

A--No, I have not.

Q--Have you had occasion to doubt it?

A--Yes, several times.
